STATE ART COLLECTION

The State of Utah started acquiring art in 1899. Today, there are more than 1,800 pieces in the State Art Collection. This year, the community-based Art Selection Committee and Utah Arts Council Board of Directors authorized the purchase of 42 works from the Utah Museum of Contemporary Art Collection. This acquisition adds in important works and deepens the existing collection of Utah artists. In addition the Acquisition Committee recommended the purchase of 17 works by Utah artists in fine art and folk art media. Six works from the State Fine Art collection were restored by the Western Center for the Conservation of Fine Art and several more works were framed in archival materials to insure preservation and longevity.

The Visual Arts team created a new exhibit for our Traveling Exhibition Program called *Out of Line: Geometric Expression in Utah*. It explores ways in which global art movements influenced Utah artists in the 1980s and 1990s. Geometric Abstraction and Neo-Expressionism each had their moment in Utah's art history, but something special happened during this time period. The two movements seemingly collided, and many Utah artists began creating art that incorporated the emotional presence of Neo-Expressionism, while drawing heavily on the shapes, patterns, fractals, and hard lines of Geometric Abstraction.

The Folk Art Collection was featured in *Made in America: Craft Icons of the 50 States*, an ambitious exhibition presented at the Mingei International Museum in San Diego. We loaned Mary Holiday Black's "Navajo Yei's Vessel" for the exhibition. Exploring regional and national craft traditions, while expressing each state's unique contribution to the richness of the American experience, this exhibition celebrates the variety of craft found in America.

The Ladies' Literary Club closed its doors in 2015. As part of the process of dissolving the interior assets, our division received a donation of 12 pieces of artwork. These works include pieces by notable Utah artists Florence Ware, JT Harwood, and Myra Sawyer.

PUBLIC ART PROJECTS

The Public Art Program commissions artists from Utah and nationwide to create site specific art in and around the public spaces of state facilities throughout Utah. This art, created by artists in collaboration with the community and the facility for which it is being created, enhances and helps build economically healthy and beautiful communities in Utah. These site specific artworks, commissioned by the Public Art Program, can take the form of architecturally incorporated elements, landscape design, glass, textile, painting and/or sculpture. The program is working to build and add to the quality public art collection belonging to the citizens of Utah.

TRAVELING EXHIBITIONS

The Traveling Exhibition Program (TEP) delivers professional exhibits to educational and nonprofit organizations in Utah. TEP is particularly important to rural communities where access to high quality and original art may be limited. These exhibits provide public access, nurture understanding of diverse art forms and cultures, promote creativity, and encourage cultural activities in local communities. This program also provides artists a way to showcase their artwork, gain public recognition, and increase the value of their art.

In FY16, TEP displayed 27 exhibitions in public schools, 16 in public libraries, eight in universities, seven in community/city centers, four in museums, and two in hospitals. Each exhibition has adaptable K-12 curriculum for teachers who instruct students in the various concepts and techniques utilized in the artwork on exhibit. New exhibitions are curated each year to keep the content relevant to the field of art, and to present new and engaging works for participants statewide.

New exhibitions for FY16 included:

Hidden Voices: Native Peoples allows Native American youth on reservations to learn the power of a photograph, and to show the world what is important to them. Photography students and faculty from Utah Valley University helped high school students develop their own photographic language for the exhibit. Collaborations involved Utah Valley University's Native American Initiative, Multicultural Student Services, Art & Visual Communication's Photography area, and Woodbury Art Museum.

The group exhibit *Shaping the Arts* showcases Utah artists who play a significant role in high school arts education. The relationship of mentors and practicing artists has deep historical roots dating back to the Middle Ages. However, the contemporary relationship between teaching artists and students in arts education has greatly expanded beyond the model of trades, formalism or aesthetics. The role of the art teacher has expanded to become a facilitator for critical discourse and meaningful explorations of contemporary, social, and cultural ideas and issues.

STATEWIDE ANNUAL COMPETITION

The Statewide Annual Competition provides national and local exposure to both emerging and established Utah artists by providing reputable jurors, publicity, and printed catalogues. Various artistic disciplines rotate in a three-year cycle: painting and sculpture; fine craft and photography & video/digital; and mixed media and works on paper. In FY16, the program introduced the category for video and digital works yielding 20 digital entries and the Best in Show Award being awarded to a video work.

VISUAL ARTS FELLOWSHIP

Each year, two \$10,000 Fellowships are awarded to individual visual artists to acknowledge their artistic excellence and encourage their careers. Artists practicing in media such as painting, drawing, printmaking, photography, sculpture, craft, and new genres are eligible. Artists must demonstrate professionalism in their practice through images and documentation.

The juror in FY16 was JoAnne Northrup, Director of Contemporary Art Initiatives at the Nevada Museum of Art. She selected Pam Bowman of Provo and David Brothers of Salt Lake City.

Pam Bowman holds an MFA in Sculpture from Brigham Young University. Her work endeavors to express the value of the human experience through installations that incorporate natural materials and traditional, labor-intensive processes. She is particularly interested in exploring how repetitive tasks and efforts compound, interact, and contribute to a greater sense of purpose.

David Brothers, using the painted and constructed set, works almost exclusively in the studio, building places and propositions. His end results are primarily photos but can also include film and installation with a recurring theme of artificiality and methods used to rebrand the fake into authentic. His work has been published in Rolling Stone, Maxim, and Popsmeat and he most recently had a solo exhibition at the Utah Museum of Contemporary Art.

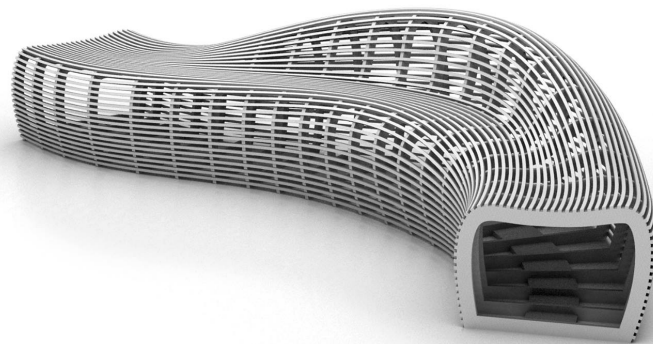


DESIGN ARTS COMPETITION

DesignArts Utah is dedicated to the promotion of excellence in the diverse fields of design in Utah. We strive to help Utahns see, experience, use and value the art of design that surrounds us daily. The Design Arts are broadly defined but often include architecture, landscape architecture, community design, environmental design (interior, lighting, etc.), product design (fashion, furniture, transportation, electronics, etc.) and industrial design.

Annually, the Design Arts Program coordinates and sponsors a juried exhibition of Utah designers from a wide variety of fields reviewed and selected by prominent Design professionals from all over the United States. DesignArts Utah '15 (FY16) project, juried by Randy Hunt, Creative Director at ETSY, received 56 design applications from professional and student Utah designers. Fifteen designs were selected for exhibition in October of 2015.

Continuing partnerships with design oriented organizations, the Design Arts Program partnered with Craft Lake City (CLC) and Salt Lake Design Week (SLDW) to support and promote the work and community benefits of Utah's designers.

UTAH'S POET LAUREATE

Utah initiated its Poet Laureate program in 1997. The Poet Laureate is a Governor-appointed advocate for literature and the arts throughout the state and serves a term of five years. The Poet Laureate is available for readings at public events, libraries, universities, and schools.

Utah Poet Laureate Lance Larsen's poetry collections include *Genius Loci*, *Backyard Alchemy*, *In All Their Animal Brilliance*, and *Erasable Walls*. He holds a PhD from the University of Houston. Since 1993, he has taught literature and creative writing at Brigham Young University.

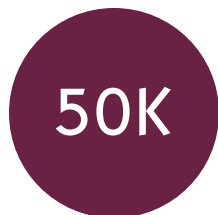
BITE-SIZE POETRY

ARTS EDUCATION

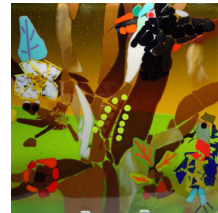
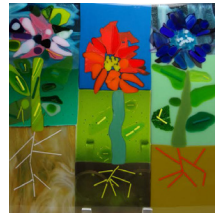
Arts Education is vital to the development of creative, independent learners. Ideal arts education includes the literary arts, dance, folk arts, theatre, music, storytelling, media and visual arts in ongoing, sequential instruction from kindergarten through grade 12. Outside of the classroom, arts learning may take place in after-school and community settings. UDAM Arts Education programs nurture compassionate individuals who will be among tomorrow's artists, STEM innovators, entrepreneurs, community builders, and responsible world citizens.

The program offers resources for professional development through universities, school districts, artistic companies and organizations.

Our program provides links to toolkits, lesson plans, curriculum development, and funding to help educators strengthen arts programs. In FY16, we continued professional development in STEAM activities such as the shibori dyeing workshop, a fascinating colorful study of the chemistry of dyes made from both plants and insects. In partnership with UDAM's Folk Arts Program, a tapa cloth workshop featuring art that comes from tapa bark on trees grown on islands in the Pacific. High school counselors guided by Navajo artists made beaded bracelets while often struggling with multiple math concepts necessary to transfer the design from graph paper to loom. Elementary teachers learned from internationally known storytellers how to increase the verbal and written skills of their students.

CAMP EAGLE SUMMER SCHOOL

Nebo Title VII Indian Education Eagle Camp

Camp Eagle in Nebo School District continues to nurture American Indian students and their families. While Camp Eagle offers summer instruction in language arts, science and math, students also create visual art and participate in performing arts activities. They learn dances for the culminating pow-wow held in the field behind Sierra Bonita Elementary School. Most importantly, students receive instruction in their tribal art forms, reinforcing their cultural identity and celebrating their native roots and families. 19 years ago, when Nebo School District began their summer Indian education program, graduation rates for Indian students hovered at 30 percent. In May 2016, 100 percent of the eligible Indian students, graduated, a remarkable feat and unprecedented in Utah. Eileen Quintana, the Title VII coordinator for Nebo School District, believes much of their success in school is due to students embracing their cultural roots and celebrating their individuality.

STEM/STEAM/BUGS, FLOWERS, RAINFOREST ANIMALS

Cedar North Elementary in Cedar City is Iron County School District’s official STEM school. Cedar North also has a successful arts program that merges the arts and sciences. In 2015/2016, under the direction of fused glass artist, Carrie Trenholm, students created fused glass pieces, one to take home but one that will be part of a site-specific public installation in a new school building that will open in 2017.

Cedar North classroom teachers began with intensive professional development workshops with the artists. Trenholm provided the professional development instruction, the teachers focused on the integrated elements which included the science core as it related to bugs, flowers and the rainforest. They worked side by side with Carrie, providing the scientific instruction while they and the kids created their fused glass art.

One of the parents said: “I am so happy that my child was able to participate in an art project that was of this quality. She’s a kindergartener and she made a glass piece about insects while learning about the scientific characteristics of insects. How cool is that? She’s never going to forget this highlight of her school year.”

UTAH POETRY OUT LOUD

Arts & Museums hosted its 11th annual state finals of Poetry Out Loud, a national recitation competition for secondary students. It is sponsored by the Poetry Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Because of the number of Utah students participating, regional competitions advance students to the state finals held in the Vieve Gore Concert Hall at Westminster College in Salt Lake City. Seven regions are led by individuals who recruit schools, mentor new teachers, guide students and facilitate competitions where highly qualified judges advance a student to the state competition.

In 2016, Bear River High School's Tessa Thornley took top honors at the state competition to represent Utah in Washington, D.C.

One example of exemplary leadership by an educator is Wayne McConkie of Box Elder High School. He incorporates POL into his curriculum, requiring nearly half of the school's student population (750) to participate in poetry memorization and recitation. In 2014, Wayne held a poetry week and invited Lance Larsen, Utah's Poet Laureate, to read and lead a poetry workshop for students. He continues to expand opportunities and as regional coordinator, established a partnership with Brigham City Library, Logan High School, Skyview High School, and Bear River High School. Box Elder High School has had three state champions: Caroline Liston, 2010; Shannon McCullam, 2011; and Sadie Merkley, 2015.

SENATE VISUAL ARTS COMPETITION

Ninety-three students representing Alpine, Beaver, Cache, Canyons, Davis, Grand, Granite, Iron, Jordan, Juab, Morgan, North Sanpete, Ogden, Provo, Salt Lake City, San Juan, Tooele, Washington, Weber School districts, charter and private schools participated in the second Utah Senate Visual Arts Scholarship Competition. Sponsored by the office of President Wayne Niederhauser, the competition celebrated the 100 year anniversary of the Utah State Capitol rotunda building.

President Wayne Niederhauser, Senator Diedre Henderson, Senator Jani Iwamoto, and art historian Lila Abersold served as judges. Additional sponsors included Art Works for Kids, 1-800 Contacts, Comcast, Zion's Bank, KeyBank and the Utah Division of Arts and Museums.

Students were honored during Arts Day on the Hill in February where President Niederhauser hosted a ceremony on the Senate floor during session. Each student's senator from their home district presented the student their award and certificate. All winning entries were exhibited through March on the third floor outside the senate chamber. The winners received cash awards deposited into a Utah Education Savings Plan account.

PERFORMING ARTS

The Performing Arts Program provides services to Utah's performing artists and presenters through professional development and community involvement and accessibility. The Performing Arts Program coordinates workshops, provides funding for professional development, and manages the OnStage in Utah grants.

This year, the Performing Arts Program supported multiple Utah artists and presenters in attending regional performing arts booking conferences to increase their professional opportunities. In collaboration with national conferences that took place in Utah, the Performing Arts Program was able to fund students from across the state to attend the United States Institute for Theatre Technology (USITT) Conference. They also helped local artists perform at the National Arts Marketing Project through Americans for the Arts (AFTA) and attend the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies (NASAA) Leadership Conference. Performing Artists also performed at a number of gallery openings for UDAM's Alice Gallery.

OnStage in Utah recognizes the important role of Utah's presenters in linking performing artists with Utah audiences. It is panel-reviewed competitive funding available to presenters to support a public performance and an additional outreach activity. Funding is awarded for professional artists who reside in or out-of-state. Presenters who apply for out-of-state artists often match these funds by applying for the TourWest grant through the Western States Arts Federation (WESTAF). The Performing Arts Program holds several training workshops annually to support presenters in seeking regional funding.

MOUNTAIN WEST ARTS CONFERENCE

For the 10th year, the Mountain West Arts Conference provided valuable networking and professional development for more than 500 people from nearly 50 cities. This consistently sold-out conference serves arts administrators, educators, artists, and arts enthusiasts.

Keynote speaker Colleen Macklin is an Associate Professor in the school of Art, Media and Technology at Parsons The New School for Design, and founder and co-director of PETLab (Prototyping Education and Technology Lab), a lab that develops games for experimental learning and social engagement. Her keynote addressed “Creative Failure: What Games Can Teach Us.” She also led a breakout session called “Modding The Metagame: Everyone’s a Critic” which explored how simple games can spark creativity and collaboration.

Conference attendees noted that networking opportunities and presentations topics were once again the main drivers that affected their attendance. With a capacity crowd and expert presenters from inside and outside Utah, the conference aimed to satisfy attendee needs. Some of the most popular sessions at the conference included:

LOCAL ARTS AGENCIES

Local Arts Agencies work to foster and support the arts in their communities. They take the form of councils, boards, committees, government entities, or nonprofit organizations, and are at the heart of community arts participation. They play an important role in advocating, encouraging and developing arts and cultural awareness. They frequently interface with local government, acting as a critical resource for community-building and raising the quality of life.

A total of 14 Local Arts Meetings were held around the state in Fiscal Year 2016 as a mechanism for our agency to connect with and support Local Arts Agencies and their community arts constituents. Listening to needs for LAAs around the state informs the topic of the Local Arts Agency Summit at the Mountain West Arts Conference — the only statewide gathering of LAAs throughout the year. With an increased interest in the field of creative placemaking, this year's LAA Summit session included communities that have been successful in their creative placemaking efforts.

In this past fiscal year, Local Arts Agencies in Utah have been awarded or finalists for prestigious, national funding opportunities:

- Midvale Arts Council was one of 25 arts organizations to be selected for the Levitt AMP [Your City] funding to bring free, professional performing arts acts to their community.
- Ogden City Arts was awarded a National Endowment for the Arts' Our Town grant to work on their city's Cultural Corridor plan.
- Epicenter (Green River) is currently a finalist for the ArtPlace America National Creative Placemaking funding.

CHANGE LEADER PROGRAM

The Change Leader Program is an active network of individuals committed to cultivating positive change through arts and culture. After attending an intensive three-day professional development institute, participants complete a unique certification project. Twelve participants attend each institute. In FY16, institutes were held in Moab and Daniels Summit.

Utah Arts & Museums launched the Change Leader Program in 2003, and Idaho and Colorado now have their own Change Leader programs based on Utah's model. Utah has over 200 certified Change Leaders representing 87 percent of Utah counties, 30 percent of which reside in rural counties.

The spring Change Leader conference was led by nationally renowned consultant, author, speaker, and educator Linda Galindo. Linda is an expert on personal and organizational accountability and led an interactive presentation titled "Lead, Follow, and Get In All The Way."

In 2016 the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies (NASAA) brought their national leadership conference to Utah in order to highlight the Change Leader Program. All 140 conference attendees had the opportunity to benefit from Change Leader training.

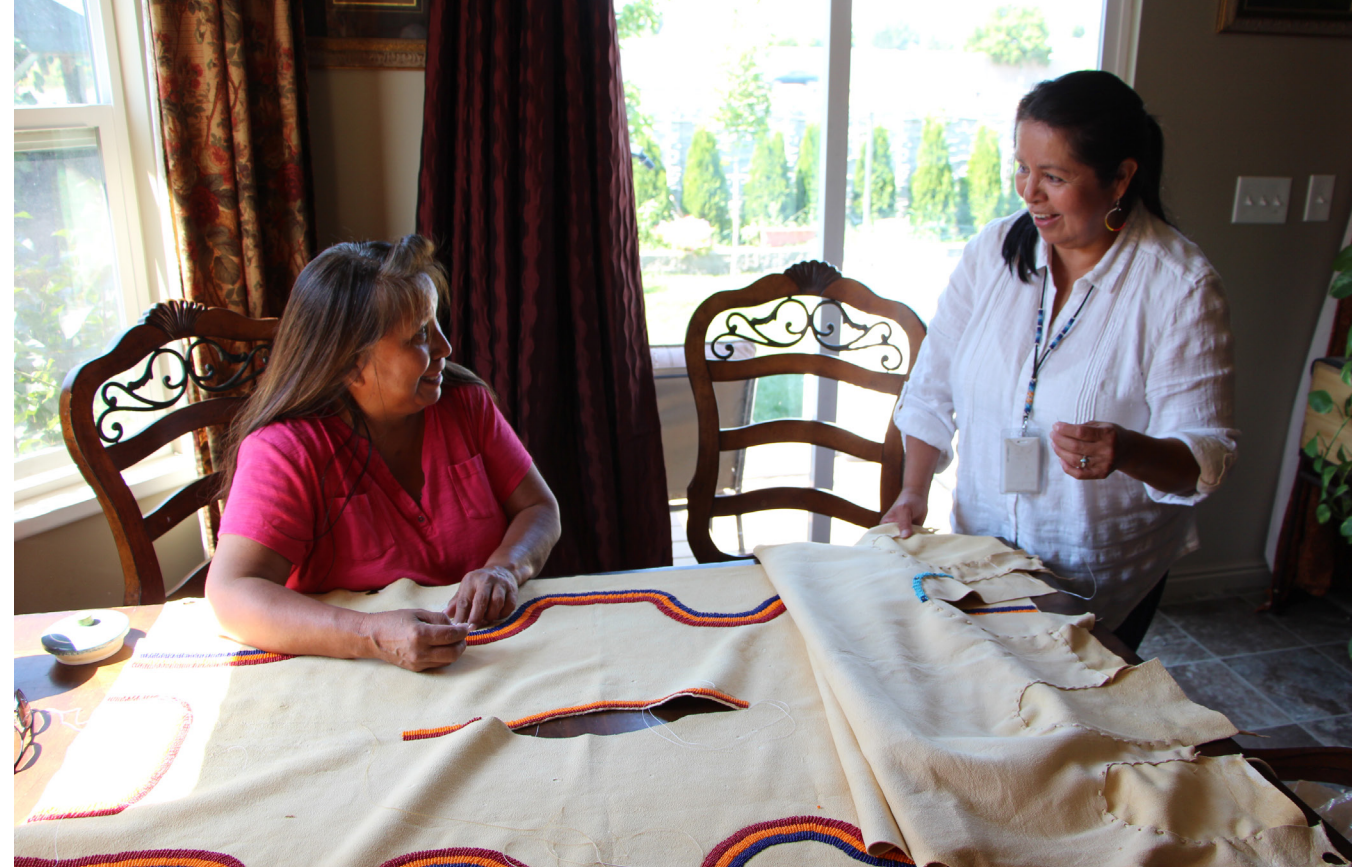
FOLK ARTS

Pioneer Day at the Chase Home offered visitors of all ages the opportunity to interact with demonstrating traditional artists and the museum experienced record attendance for the year.

In FY16, two new full-time staff members were hired: a Museum Specialist and a Folk Arts Specialist. Assisted by other staff, this new team has revitalized the exhibits, educational modules, and presentations at the Chase Home Museum. Cultivating new relationships with community partners, the Chase Home team initiated projects with a diverse group of organizations including Lifelong Learning at the University of Utah, the Salt Lake City Arts Council, and Tracy Aviary.

Artist demonstrations and workshops were offered in outreach settings to better educate the public about the State Folk Art Collection and traditional arts in Utah. Inside the museum a new multi-use space increased the number of hosted classes, workshops, temporary exhibitions, and educational programs at the Chase Home.

In order to better care for and display the objects in the Folk Art Collection, staff curated and installed a new exhibit of Native American folk art that includes Navajo baskets, Hopi pottery, and several different styles of beadwork. In the coming year, the current Ethnic and Occupational galleries will be curated with many never-before-displayed objects to better educate visitors about Utah's diverse cultural heritage.

MONDAYS IN THE PARK

The 2015 Mondays in the Park season (FY16) once again saw the Folk Arts program engage in a successful partnership with Excellence in the Community which provided production services. This year's Mondays in the Park concert series featured ten performing groups representing cultural communities found throughout Utah.

The season began with an evening of music and dance with acclaimed musician and composer Nino Reyos and the dancers of Two Shields, a Native American dance company based in Salt Lake City. It ended with dance group Ballet Folklórico de las Americas accompanied by the musicians of Mariachi Sol de Jalisco.

Other performers included:

- Desibels, a local Indian musical group
- Island Time II, performing Polynesian music and dance

MUSEUMS SERVICES

Utah Arts & Museums strives to advance the value of Utah's museums, help them care for their collections, and enable the broadest access to collections and programs. We provide technical assistance to Utah's 285 museums and partners with the Utah Museums Association in an online directory.

Each February, museum professionals and volunteers meet at the Capitol for Museum Advocacy Day, an opportunity to meet with state representatives, explore displays, and support Utah's varied museums.

In FY16, 30 museums and 64 museum professionals attended Museum Advocacy Day, ranging from art to history and heritage museums.

In FY16 there were 153 Certified Utah Museums, up 12.5 percent from last year's 136 certifications. In FY16 all museum grant applicants submitted a self-assessment of their progress toward the Utah State Performance Goals. Museums reviewed their practices in the areas of structure, staff, finance, facilities, collections, exhibitions, education and public relations. The aggregate scores provide a baseline for museum needs that over operations, collections and education and meets the Governor's SUCCESS program.

MUSEUMS PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

MUSEUM PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Utah Arts & Museums is an essential resource for funding, technical assistance, and training for Utah's diverse and rich museum community. Large and small museums in our state benefit from the work of this essential division and the engagement with our programs and initiatives strengthens the work we do and extends its reach into the communities we serve. In FY16, 34 museums were funded for projects ranging from exhibition interpretation initiatives to collections stabilization.

MUSEUM TRAINING

Utah Arts & Museums partnered with Utah Humanities to implement the Museum Interpretation Initiative, a five-part workshop series dedicated to improving small museum exhibitions. In addition to working with partner organizations, Utah Arts & Museums provides hands-on training and assistance through workshops hosted by our Museum Program Manager, Jennifer Ortiz. Since July 2015, Utah Arts and Museums has partnered and provided 11 hands-on workshops that have serviced 229 museum professionals from across the state, reaching 24 different counties.

UTAH MUSEUMS ASSOCIATION CONFERENCE

Utah Arts & Museums provided operational support and scholarships to the annual Utah Museums Association conference, held in Lehi October 7-9th, 2015. Support for the conference included \$10,000 for scholarships, which allowed 35 museum professionals to attend the conference at low-to-no cost. The conference featured 21 concurrent sessions, three workshops, and two evening events that catered to 145 attendees from across the state.

MUSEUM COLLECTIONS RESOURCES

In FY16, Utah Arts and Museums introduced a number of tools designed to address the collection care needs of museums across the state. Preservation Assessments, a tool created to address museum's critical collection care needs in FY15, were funded on a rolling basis in FY16. Seven museums were awarded a total of \$22,608 to address significant collections care projects ranging from stabilizing collections storage to improving lighting standards in the museum.

CHASE HOME MUSEUM OF UTAH FOLK ARTS

Entering the museum's fifth year of extended hours, the Chase Home Museum still sees visitors who are discovering it for the first time. Special events hosted in conjunction with World Refugee Day and Pioneer Day introduced the museum and its unique exhibitions to over 900 visitors. Because of the extensive audience development work completed over the course of the past year, Chase Home staff were presented with the Governor's Award of Excellence in Public Service in recognition of their responsiveness, innovation, and stewardship.

The Chase Home Museum hosted interactive workshops dedicated to presenting folk arts and museum best practices. Museum professional development was facilitated through a partnership with Utah Humanities and the Museum Interpretation Initiative resulting in a series of five workshops for museum professionals dedicated to improving interpretation standards. Workshops at the Chase Home organized by the Folk Arts Program included topics such as Classical Indian Dance, Eastern European Egg Dyeing, Scottish Weaving, and Grant Writing.

Utilizing the museum space in new ways, staff installed three new exhibitions in the temporary gallery over the course of the year: a show featuring the Peruvian retablos of National Heritage Fellow Jeronimo Lozano; *Healing Through Art*, featuring work created by refugee communities in the Wasatch Front, presented in partnership with the Holladay Arts Council and the Department of Workforce Services; and the *Living Traditions Festival 30th Anniversary Retrospective*.

GRANTS PROGRAM

The competitive grant program for the Utah Division of Arts & Museums serves the state by providing general operating and project support grants for arts organizations, cultural institutions, and museums. Last year our agency gave over 260 grants. The grants program is available to every community in the state. Evaluations from our grantees report that arts participation made possible in part by our grants was 8 million museum visits and 5 million arts activities.

In FY16, UDAM celebrated a significant milestone: all grant final reports were submitted online. This provides consistency and accuracy in our grant review processes. Additionally, all grantees are in compliance with the Utah Division of Consumer Protection regulation regarding charitable solicitations. All grants are carefully reviewed by peers from the art and museum community. Available grant categories include Museum project grants, Arts Organization Sustainability and Capacity Building grants, Local Arts Agency grants, Arts Education Grants, and Arts Project Grants.

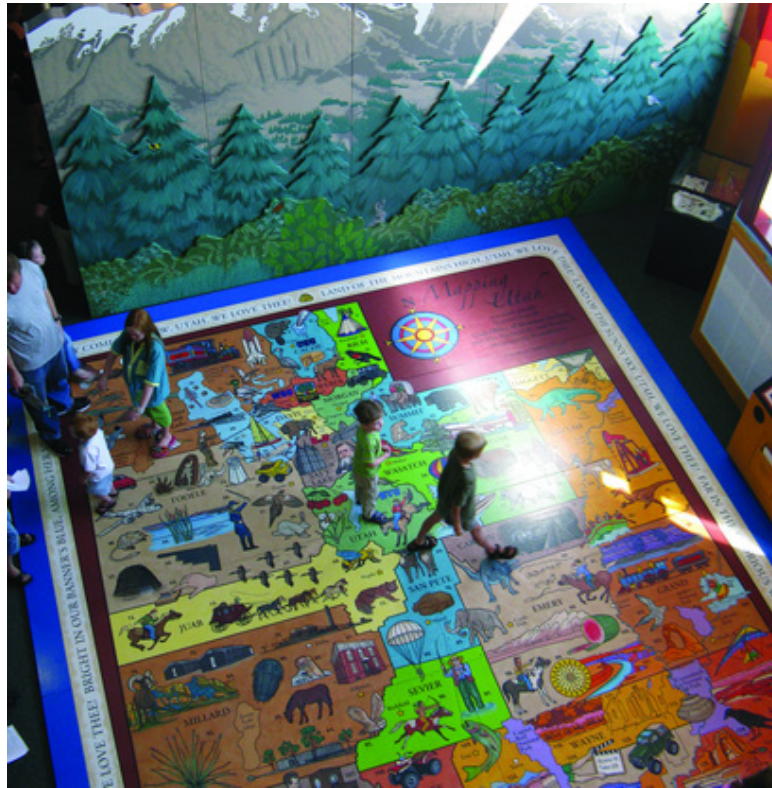
