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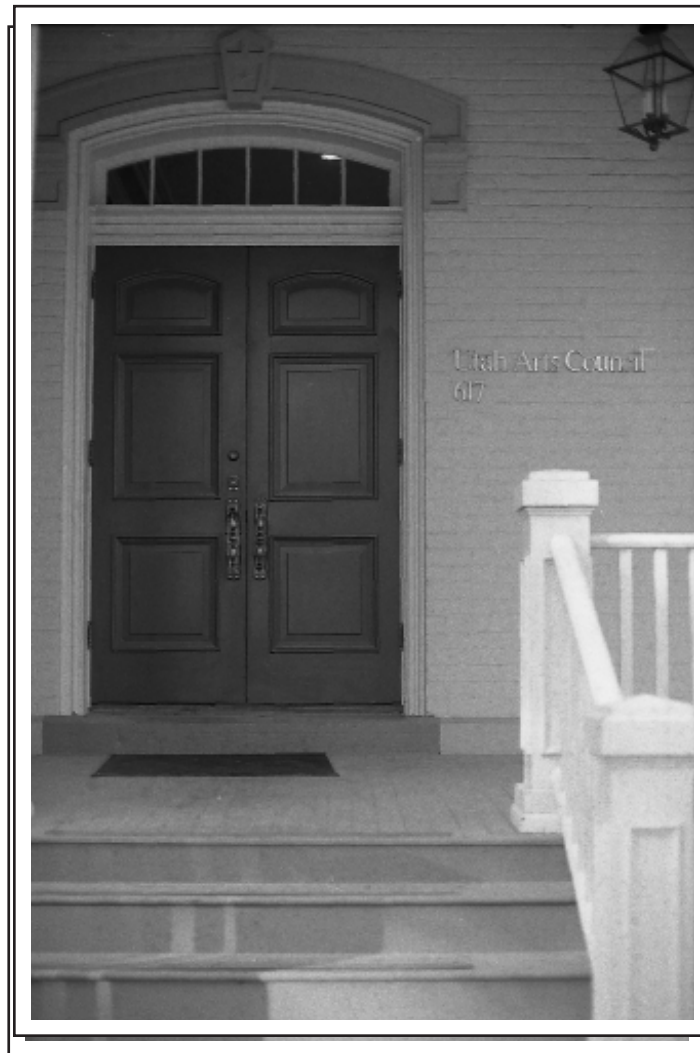

# UTAH ARTS COUNCIL

Established in 1899 by Utah's Third Legislature, the Utah Arts Council is the oldest state arts agency in the nation. It is a division of the Utah Department of Community and Economic Development. The Utah Arts Council receives funding from the Utah State Legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts, Washington, D.C.



## MISSION STATEMENT

Believing that the arts are essential to a high quality of life, the Utah Arts Council serves all the people of the State as it fosters creativity, promotes excellence, and encourages diversity in the arts in Utah. In response to the legislative mandate of 1899 "to advance the arts in all their phases," the Utah Arts Council broadens the availability and increases the appreciation of the arts by securing and distributing funds, providing training and development, and providing educational programs in the arts statewide.

## GOALS

- ♦ To encourage, recognize and support the growth of artistic excellence on both individual and organizational levels.
- ♦ To increase public awareness, appreciation and understanding of the central role the arts play in all dimensions of life.
- ♦ To advocate the inclusion of the arts as essential to the educational experience of all Utahns.
- ♦ To insure that diverse arts experiences are accessible to all Utahns, regardless of geographic area, ethnicity, religion, income, age, gender or ability.
- ♦ To preserve and promote Utah's artistic heritage and cultural traditions while encouraging new artistic exploration and creation.
- ♦ To expand our response to arts needs through planning and evaluation that utilizes broad and interactive public representation.
- ♦ To advocate for adequate resources to fulfill the mission of the Utah Arts Council.

## MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR


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This has been a difficult year economically, but nonetheless has been a great year for the Utah Arts Council. Under the Board's direction, the UAC has achieved some major accomplishments. Each program has had its successes. We have been able to realize goals we thought impossible in the current economic climate. For example:

- ♦ The Utah Cultural Center is gaining momentum, in response to the efforts of the Utah Arts Council and its partners.
- ♦ The Artist Services Program stepped up its campaign to increase endowments that assist artists and ethnic arts groups, raising a total of \$24,496.
- ♦ The Arts Education Program, in partnership with the Utah State Office of Education, drafted three initiatives in answer to President Bush's "No Child Left Behind" Act, to help teachers with professional development in arts and integrated learning.
- ♦ The Community/State Partnership Program has taken its workshops to all corners of the state to help arts organizations develop good leadership and fundraising techniques, increasingly important in today's economic climate.
- ♦ The Folk Arts Program received a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to initiate an Audio Archive Project to stabilize 1200 audio recordings in the Utah State Folklife Archive.
- ♦ The Literature Program found publishers for two of its Publication Prizewinning book manuscripts.
- ♦ Although the State Legislature did not approve funding for new public art projects in fiscal year 02, the Public Art Program was able to assist three locations with installations, and Utah's program is being recognized nationally for its importance to public art.
- ♦ The Traveling Exhibits Program continued to enrich rural communities with its exhibits.
- ♦ The Visual Arts Program was able to expand the Rio Gallery and install track lighting, enabling the Utah Arts Council to curate its own exhibit of the 2002 Fellowship Winners instead of contracting with an outside gallery, thus saving thousands of dollars.

The climate of the coming fiscal year has yet to reveal what's in store for us. We will continue to weather the economic storm and provide for Utah's arts community in the best way we can—the only way we know how.

## OLYMPIC INVOLVEMENT

Everyone in Salt Lake City in February 2002 felt the effects of the Olympic Winter Games, and the Utah Arts Council was no exception. Many important Olympic activities were centered on things other than sports. Artists and performers also vied for attention as the world descended on Salt Lake City. The Salt Lake Organizing Committee's Cultural Olympiad coordinated many performances, exhibits and events involving international, national, and local artists.

The Utah Arts Council was involved with the Cultural Olympiad from the beginning of the planning process through the culmination of the Winter Games. The Glendinning offices of the UAC were a gathering place for Utah's cultural community and the Cultural Olympiad staff to come together, under the leadership of UAC Director Bonnie Stephens, to share ideas and concerns. The UAC championed local participation in the cultural component of the 2002 Winter Games. The UAC worked with the Western States Arts Federation (WESTAF) to prepare a research document of the Olympics Cultural Component over the ages, which proved valuable to the Salt Lake Organizing Committee and will hopefully be valuable to other Olympics for years to come.

The following are some of the activities in which UAC staff participated:

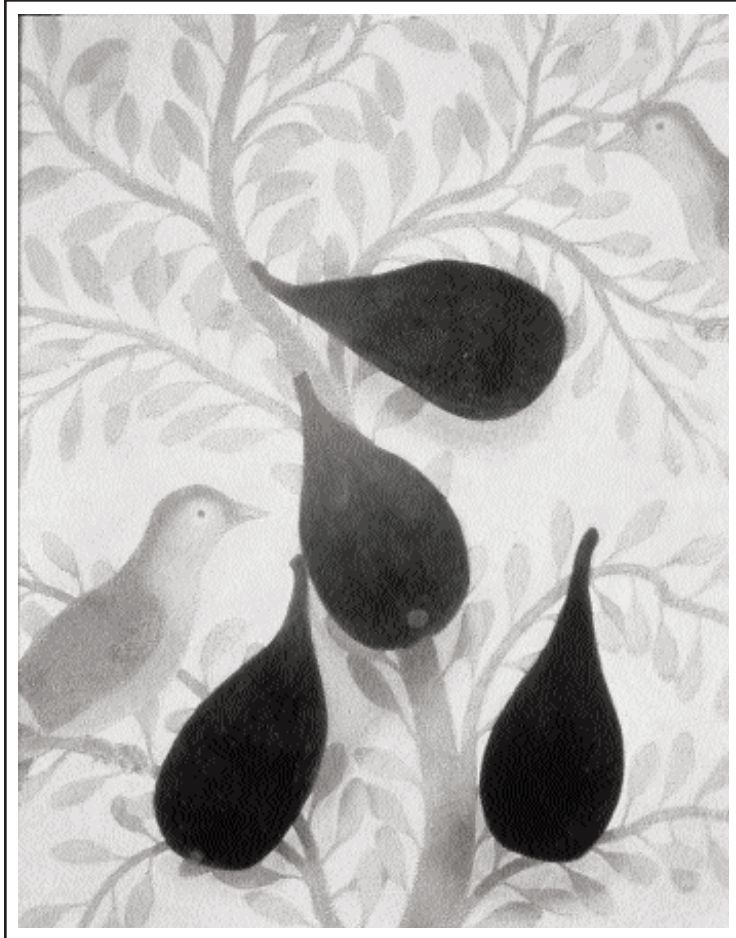
- ♦ Arts Education Program staff (Jean Irwin, Wendi Anderson, Jasmine Pahnke) were involved in planning the Imagination Celebration two years in advance of the Games, and worked to bring artists and community arts partners together. The 2002 Imagination Celebration brought artists and arts companies into Salt Lake School District schools to prepare students for residencies and performances that took place during the Olympics.
- ♦ In advance of the Games, UAC staff (Jennifer Broschinsky, with input from Sherry Waddingham and other staff members) helped the Cultural Olympiad administer the Community Heritage Invitational Grants program, which awarded 30 matching grants of up to \$3,000 to communities and organizations around Utah. Grant recipients planned cultural activities in their own communities to celebrate the Games.

- ♦ The UAC was also involved in art exhibits at various venues. Lila Abersold, Visual Arts Program Coordinator, served on a committee to select paintings and sculpture for the Springville Museum of Art's exhibition, *Utah Art, Utah Artists*. Eighteen pieces from the State Fine Arts Collection appeared in the exhibit. UAC staff also installed paintings and sculpture from the State Fine Arts Collection in the Governor's Mansion, the Devereaux Mansion, the Governor's board room, and the State Capitol exhibit cases for the duration of the Games.
  - ♦ UAC staff (Carol Edison, Bonnie Stephens, Terrie Buhler) made exhibit arrangements for the IOC Clubhouse, showcasing pieces from local artists, including Kathleen Peterson, Joseph Bennion, Royden Card, Ed Firmage Jr., Elsie Holiday, John Collins, Clay Christensen, Daisy Joe, Rob Ray, Clayton Sireech, and James Stewart. Items from the State Folk Arts Collection, including rugs, Polynesian quilts, Navajo baskets and other folk art, were also lent to the State Capitol, the VIP lounge at Rice-Eccles Stadium, and to the Utah Museum of Natural History for their "Utah's First Nations" exhibit.
  - ♦ Jean Irwin, Arts Education Program Coordinator, was one of 20 women invited to participate in the Cultural Olympiad sponsored Women Beyond Borders exhibit at the Art Access Gallery. Each woman received a 2x3" wood box and was invited to create an assemblage. The boxes by Utah women were added to an exhibit including works by women around the world.
- Coordinator, served as chauffeurs for international guests during the Games.
- ♦ Laura Durham of the Visual Arts Program, Bertie Stoker of the Community/State Partnership Program, and Jasmine Pahnke of the Arts Education Program both served at the Utah Media Center.

The Utah Arts Council loaned several staff members to help during the Olympics:

- ♦ Jim Glenn, the UAC Public Art Program Coordinator, worked with the Cultural Olympiad staff for 10 months to manage the Chihuly 2002 Exhibition, coordinate installation of Allan Houser sculptures at various locations in Salt Lake City, and coordinate the Declaration of Independence Exhibit at the State Capitol.
- ♦ Jennifer Broschinsky, UAC Public Information Officer, worked at the Olympic Arts Festival office for the month of February, her primary function to coordinate 70 Arts & Culture volunteers.
- ♦ Craig Miller, Folk Arts Program Assistant Coordinator, and Guy Lebeda, Literature Program

## ARTIST SERVICES PROGRAM

The Utah Arts Council supports and encourages the work of Utah artists through its Artist Services Program, which serves all artistic disciplines. Program goals are:

- ♦ to provide financial assistance and recognition to artists, facilitating their creative endeavor through Artist Grants.
- ♦ to serve as a resource for information and assistance and as an administrative facilitator for artists.
- ♦ to expand communication among artists and between artists and the public.
- ♦ to increase public awareness of the individual artists living and working in Utah and their contributions to the State.
- ♦ to increase the Individual Artist Endowment to help accomplish these goals.

## ARTIST GRANTS

In fiscal year 2002 the Artist Services Program awarded Artist Grants to 20 artists, out of 136 applicants. The total awarded was \$24,000 from a total requested of \$160,451. Artists who applied had a 1:6.3 chance of funding. Of the 136 applicants, 94 live in Salt Lake County, with 14 counties across the state represented.

Grants funded the creation of new work (silkscreens, a chap book, a video dance work, paintings, composition, choreography, and writing); purchased a canopy, light box materials, and a digital camera;

completed a ceramics studio; assisted with framing and documenting work; helped produce CDs; and supported travel and research.

Peer panels in ten disciplines reviewed applications in June and October. They established their recommendations on the aesthetic quality, invention, and consistency exhibited in applicant support materials, the proposed use of funds as an extension of artists' work, and artists' level of commitment to their work.

## ARTIST ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN

Artist Grants utilize interest drawn from the Individual Artist Endowment, established by a 1991 National Endowment for the Arts Challenge Grant. In order to increase funds for fellowships and grants, the Utah Arts Council launched the Artist Endowment Campaign. The campaign seeks a total of \$1,080,000 to double the existing Artist and Ethnic Arts Endowments, increasing fellowships and grants for Utah artists.

Contributions to the Utah Artist Endowments support Utah's individual artists in perpetuity and are tax-deductible. Total contributions to the Individual Artist Endowment as of June 30, 2002 were \$32,356.

A benefit performance by Recent Artist Grantees on September 7, 2001 showcased the talents of nine performing artists at the new Jeanne Wagner Theater. Performances included Roger Benington and Rodney Cuellar's *Tales from the 1001 Nights*; Scott Carrier's *Little*

The Rio Gallery hosted an exhibit showcasing Artist Grantees March 8 - April 19, including work by Alex Bigney, James Charles, Dana Costello, Lenka Konopasek, Lori Nelson, Steve Stones, Daniel Arsenault, Earl Denet, Sue Cotter, Kathleen Royster, and Maryann Webster. Over 150 arts patrons attended the March 15 opening reception.

*The Art of Wine*, a fundraising event initiated by Steering Committee members Ricklin Nobis and Andy Glantz, was hosted with utmost generosity by John Williams of The New Yorker. On June 15th, eight pairs of tasters were treated to an orchestrated wine tasting led by Scott O'neil, who shared his extensive knowledge of wines as well as his choice of musical accompaniment. "The food was excellently conceived and presented, the wines handled with fine, European deftness, and the service perfectly seamless and unparalleled here in Utah," wrote Andy Glantz. Each wine was accompanied by the work of an Artist Grantee including Dana Costello, Valerie Dow, Catherine Downing, and Lori Nelson. *The Art of Wine* raised the year's second largest amount, \$5,250, with an in-kind donation of over \$5000 by John Williams.

Utah Arts Council efforts to showcase the exceptional talent of Utah Artist Grantees makes evident the need for increased fellowships and grants to recognize and support the finest artists working in Utah. The efforts of the Utah Artist Endowment Campaign Board resulted in \$24,496 increase to the Artist Endowments, compared with \$9,072 the previous year.

## ARTOPS NEWSLETTER

*ArtOps* is a quarterly newsletter of artist opportunities in its seventh year of publication. In fiscal year 2002, *ArtOps* had a circulation of approximately 2,000. Each issue listed over 140 opportunities for

artists in all disciplines. Utah artists and organizations may subscribe to this free service, jointly compiled by the Utah Arts Council's Artist Services, Visual Arts, and Literature programs.

### **THE ARTIST RESOURCE CENTER**

In its sixth year of operation, the Artist Resource Center continued to expand its library with current

periodicals and resource books covering business and legal issues, marketing strategies, artist residencies, funding sources, etc. The Artist Resource Center also made available to artists its computers (both MacIntosh and PC), typewriter, copy machine, and dual-deck VCR tape recorder. A joint effort of the Utah Arts Council's

Artist Services and Visual Arts programs, the Artist Resource Center at the Rio Grande Depot and is open on an appointment basis.

### **PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

In fiscal year 2002 the Artist Services Program coordinated five professional development workshops: two on grant writing, two on slide making, and one for media artists. These workshops served 79 artists. Workshops conducted by staff members in Salt Lake City incurred no programming dollar cost.

### **DATABASE OF INDIVIDUAL ARTISTS**

The database of 4,300 individual artists is an important resource to the arts community.

## ARTS EDUCATION PROGRAM

The mission of the Arts Education (AE) Program is to foster life-long learning in the arts and to encourage the inclusion of the arts as an essential component in both formal and informal learning experiences of all Utahns. Activities in creative writing, dance, music, theatre and visual arts reward independent thought and creative problem solving; give individuals the chance to express themselves honestly through verbal and non-verbal means; empower young people and adults to sense and exercise artistic authority within themselves; offer ways of sharing and fostering human values; provide solace, nurturing and comfort; promote appropriate risk-taking; and encourage focused, disciplined progress from idea, through a process, to a final form.

The AE Program meets its mission by providing grant funds, conferences, workshops and technical assistance. AE offers five types of financial support for AE activities in schools and community settings, including artists in residence, innovative AE projects, action research, art education plan implementation, and the creation of new works in an educational setting. Funds also support projects for organizations and schools offering arts learning opportunities to individuals in underserved sites, including those who are institutionalized, incarcerated, geographically isolated, hospitalized, disabled, or otherwise disenfranchised from the mainstream arts community.

Partnerships are an important part of the AE Program. In partnership with the Utah State Office of Education, AE provides professional development for teachers in dance, music, theatre and visual arts. Partnerships with professional artistic companies and organizations assure that constituents have access to outstanding artists and works of art combined with educational activities. Partnerships with organizations such as Art Access/VSA Arts of Utah assure access to arts education activities for those with disabilities and special needs. A partnership with the Utah Alliance for Arts and Humanities fosters networking, technical assistance, advocacy and the development of symposia

to address philosophical and pragmatic issues faced by educators in public and private schools, colleges and universities. Partnerships with professional organizations such as the Utah Arts Education Association and the Utah Theatre Association support additional professional development activities for classroom teachers in Utah.

UAC/AE and the Utah State Office of Education Fine Arts Division are implementing two new initiatives (the Infinity Project and the RAM Project) that emerged during a Think Tank held in June 2002 at Daniel Summit.

Participants included representatives from the State Legislature, the Board of Regents, the State Board of Education, artistic companies, higher education, public schools, and business.

The Infinity Project supports teachers as they explore the major artistic works offered by professional companies. The project supports pre-event discussions lead by scholars and is followed by a hands-on workshops that help teachers translate components of the event into arts learning activities for students. The RAM (Reading, Arts and Math) project is designed to infuse teachers with professional development activities in the arts and in the emotional and social development of students. School teams of teachers, arts specialists, reading and math specialists and school counselors then design lesson plans that target the lowest CRT scores in reading and math. Both initiatives recognize the importance of active engagement in the arts for arts sake but also recognize the arts as the most powerful tool for integration and for developing the emotional and social well-being of students.

## ARTS EDUCATION PROGRAM 2002 HIGHLIGHTS

### MAKING A DIFFERENCE

AE always looks for evidence that its programs are indeed making a difference even in the most remote regions of Utah. Beverly Mangham, an assemblage artist worked with eleven students ages five through seven at Flaming Gorge Elementary School in Dutch John. Each day, Beverly had the kids spend about 30 minutes reflecting and talking about their work. Beverly expected them to use the appropriate vocabulary-no dummieing down here. During a site visit, AE staff observed students working to create something that floats and heard one first-grader say, "I don't like the symmetry of my piece. I want to redo it so the balance is still there but it doesn't look so boring."

Art Access/Very Special Arts of Utah procured the AE Program's assistance in writing a grant proposal to the National Endowment for the Arts for its Challenge America program. The NEA funded the request in full. The grant supported a project at the Horizonte School, an alternative high school and training center in the Salt Lake School District that boasts students from 67 countries, speaking 82 languages. William Ivey, then Chairman of the NEA, toured the facility in June 2001 when he announced the grant award.

The grant brought Jenkin and Eldon Powell, well-known stained glass artists, to Horizonte, where they

worked with students to produce huge glass masks. Today the masks hang from the ceiling of the school's center atrium. Students also exhibited at the Art Access Gallery. This project continues today.

AE works hard to nurture programs that promote healing and individual growth. One such creative writing residency took place in the Central Utah Correctional Facility where Nancy Takacs worked with adult inmates. One inmate wrote the following poem:

### Voices

Those able we ought to hear them  
they're worthy messages often lent to teach.  
Deceptive distractions arising  
Creating temptations of mischief  
So act with greater caution aware of the risks  
Hear only those voices influencing compassionate vision  
quests.

### **BUILDING STRONGER PARTNERSHIPS**

AE refined an ongoing partnership with the Utah Parent Teacher Association. AE is the only discipline included on Utah PTA's list of legislative priorities. AE provides arts advocacy information to some 140,000 Utah PTA members. At the May, 2002 PTA statewide convention, AE provided two sessions in arts education: one, Japanese kite making taught by Ali Fujino of the Drachen Foundation, and two, a visual arts session combining use of many materials. The area where parents could make books and marble paper was a favorite. Because AE sessions are so popular, UAC/AE

will have an entire “creative space” devoted to making art at the 2003 statewide PTA convention, which hosts some 2100 parents. The space, open for two days, will provide participants with the opportunity to make art during the entire conference.

AE's involvement with the Utah PTA led to Utah's role as a pilot for three new categories in the National PTA's Reflections Program: Dance, Theatre, and Film/Video. Four years of success in this pilot activity demonstrated the importance of the performing and media arts. In Utah, AE benefited from numerous chances to inform parents about all three art forms and advocate for the inclusion of all art forms in Utah schools. Participation in those categories continues to grow.

## COMMUNITY/STATE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

As a partner and resource, the Community/State Partnership (CSP) Program provides professional development leading toward growth and stabilization of local nonprofit arts and cultural organizations; enables nonprofit arts and cultural organizations to foster greater cultural awareness, understanding and quality of life through the arts in their communities; encourages partnerships between arts organizations and other public and private entities; and helps create an atmosphere in which the arts become a component for community enrichment and future economic growth. The program serves as an anchor for communities statewide and helps them meet the challenges of geographic, cultural and financial isolation. The components of the CSP Program include the following:

### TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

CSP views the arts as a vital component of thriving communities. Program staff members encourage community arts organizations to collaborate with a broad range of “non-arts” individuals and organizations. Through this process, arts/cultural organizations begin playing a leadership role in the future of the communities. CSP staff members provide technical assistance to organizations in all phases of development, from the inception of a community cultural program to development of organizational structure in long-range planning, setup of nonprofit status, board development and cultural assessment. During fiscal year 2002 CSP offered 28 workshops, retreats and meetings in nonprofit operations within Utah and IRS codes, nonprofit structure and operations, board development and governance, marketing, grant writing, volunteer management, collaboration and use of the arts as a tool for community and economic development. The CSP Program also maintains a resource library that is continually expanding with publications on nonprofit organizational management, performing arts presenting techniques, development, public relations, planning, marketing resource development and much more. All of

the materials in the library are available as a resource to artists, arts managers, and administrators.

### CHALLENGE AMERICA PILOT PROGRAM

This year marked the first full year of a new professional development program, the *Pilot Program*, a joint partnership of the Utah Arts Council Community State Partnership Program, the Front Porch Institute, and the National Endowment for the Arts. Participants in this program were selected according to special criteria for underserved and rural arts organizations. The most outstanding features of the program are the unique curricula with a strong emphasis on good communication skills, and the creation of a support network with mentoring and coaching by instructors and other participants. In fiscal year 2002, the first four sessions of the program were held throughout the state in Mt. Pleasant, Park City, Salt Lake City and Price. Some of the development curricula included community arts movement history, advocacy for the arts within the community, leadership development,



teambuilding, nonprofit board development and creating a civic dialogue on the arts. Eighteen organizations were represented with 20 participants in the program in over 64 hours of on-site training. This is a two-year certificate program that will be completed in fiscal year 2003.

### **UTAH PERFORMING ARTS TOUR**

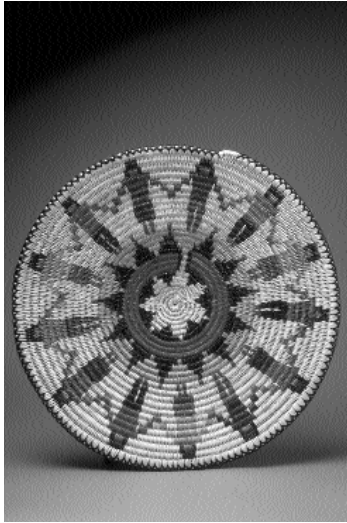
Founded on the concept of partnership—sharing the cost, the responsibility and the success—the Utah Performing Arts Tour offers nonprofits throughout the state the finest local, regional and national artists and companies at affordable prices. In both large and small communities, the Tour encourages and supports professional artistic activities that otherwise might not take place, whether a first-time chamber music concert in a rural town or a post-modern dance event on a university campus. CSP provides consultation and technical assistance to guide sponsoring organizations through the intricacies of developing a successful performing arts event and/or series. In addition, the CSP staff is available to offer technical assistance in developing artist promotion packets, marketing, press releases, touring and audience development.

### **ALTERNATIVE FUNDING RESOURCES**

Cuts in federal funding have created a highly competitive fundraising market, making it imperative

that those seeking funding explore alternative sources. Small arts organizations are at a particular disadvantage in the search for funding opportunities, often lacking the skills and knowledge necessary to prepare an effective grant proposal, and having limited access to the opportunities available. The Alternative Funding Resources Program serves a very real need by extending professional support to these constituents, not only in researching and providing information on granting opportunities and assisting in the preparation of appropriate materials for submission, but also in networking within the community and discovering creative avenues for collaboration. The CSP staff consults with organizations and individuals throughout the state. A library of resource materials and a database for customized information access are available to serve constituents. Research activities are on-going to identify as many funding sources outside the Utah Arts Council—local, regional, national and international—as possible. This service is a unique example of the Utah Arts Council's commitment to preserving the arts in Utah.

## FOLK ARTS PROGRAM

Traditional crafts, music, dance and stories passed down through families, communities or within tribal, ethnic or occupational groups are among the many forms of folk art found in Utah today. These artistic skills, which reflect the values of earlier generations, are a vital component of community identity.

The role of the Folk Arts (FA) Program is to assist Utah's cultural communities in perpetuating their own artistic traditions and maintaining their unique identities. The FA Program assists by offering programs and activities that nurture and celebrate traditional artists and art forms while fostering public understanding and pride in our multifaceted cultural heritage.

The FA Program documents the traditional arts of Utah's cultural communities, promotes public understanding of these traditions through the production of events and educational products, and administers grants that encourage preservation of these skills for future generations.

### SPECIFICALLY THE FOLK ARTS PROGRAM:

- ♦ identifies and documents artists and their work and protects the resulting photographs and recordings in the Utah State Folklife Archives.
- ♦ produces exhibits, audio-visual materials and publications.
- ♦ presents performances, demonstrations, workshops, lectures, radio shows and festivals.
- ♦ recognizes master traditional artists through the purchase of folk art for the State Arts Collection.
- ♦ encourages perpetuation of traditional skills through Apprenticeship Grants.
- ♦ assists communities in developing and sharing their arts through Ethnic Arts Grants.
- ♦ offers consultations and other forms of technical assistance to individuals and groups.

## FISCAL YEAR 2002 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

### UTAH TRADITIONS 2002 CALENDAR

"Diverse-City of Salt Lake," the first of a series of annual calendars highlighting Utah's cultural communities and their artistic traditions, featured the surprising diversity of ethnicity, race and religion among traditional artists who call Salt Lake City home. The calendar included over 100 photographs of folk and ethnic performers, craftspeople and their artwork as well as twelve essays on local communities that ranged from indigenous native groups and immigrant communities of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries to Utah's most recent refugees. This calendar shows how the traditional arts provide a way for people to express their identity, share their heritage, and celebrate their differences and similarities. The calendar was distributed to featured artists, libraries, social studies teachers and the general public. A thousand copies were also distributed across the country as part of the 2002 Olympic Torch Run.

### AUDIO ARCHIVE PROJECT

Since 1976 the Folk Arts Program staff has made recordings of Utah's traditional artists either in their

living rooms and workshops, talking about their lives and their traditional art, or in performance at home or on festival and concert stages. Taken as a whole, these recordings represent an unparalleled view of traditional art and life in Utah. FA staff made early recordings on reel-to-reel, then on audiocassette, and now on DAT or digital audio tape.

In fiscal year 2002, the FA Program received grant funds from the National Endowment for the Humanities to work towards stabilizing the over 1200 audio recordings in the Utah State Folklife Archive. With goals to both preserve and make these recordings more accessible, the FA Program used the grant funds to purchase equipment to transfer all of the recordings into a digital format on CDs. Now one copy can be stored for preservation purposes, a second can become a working copy for easy access, and the original materials can be safely stored without additional handling.

#### **MONDAYS IN THE PARK CONCERTS**

Coinciding with its return last year to the newly renovated Chase Home, the FA Program improved and expanded its Mondays in the Park Concert Series. In addition to a new color brochure and an updated web site, FA expanded the concert series from one month to two. This enabled FA to present eight free concerts throughout July and August featuring folk and ethnic artists from a variety of local communities. The season began with Hopi dancers and Navajo musicians and ended with cowboy music and poetry. Nearly 200 artists from another dozen local communities, Venezuelan to Tibetan, Greek to Japanese, shared their traditions with enthusiastic audiences from their own communities and their Salt Lake neighbors.

#### **FOLK MASTERS AT THE STATE FAIR**

On the first Saturday of the Utah State Fair in September of 2001, the FA Program presented its day-long folklife festival, Utah Folk Masters. Throughout the morning and afternoon ten master-apprentice pairs from around the state, all recipients of Apprenticeship Project Grants, demonstrated their traditional crafts for visitors. The evening ended with an exciting performance by the Utah Hispanic Dance Alliance. Fair visitors were treated to choreographed performances by 30 fine dancers presenting a repertoire of dance traditions from the various Central and South American countries of their origin. Approximately 7,000 visitors enjoyed the event.

#### **THE LIVING TRADITIONS FESTIVAL**

In May 2002, the FA Program presented Living Traditions: A Celebration of Salt Lake's Folk & Ethnic

Art in downtown Salt Lake City, now in its seventeenth year. Produced in conjunction with the Salt Lake City Arts Council, this free three-day event attracted over 40,000 visitors with continuous music and dance, crafts demonstrations and ethnic food presented by 600 artists from some 40 local ethnic communities. As always the festival provided an important fund-raising opportunity for the 20 ethnic organizations that sell traditional food to support their local art programs. More than 2,000 students attended a Friday morning edition of the festival sponsored by the Utah State Office of Education.

#### **UINTAH BASIN SURVEY**

Folklorist Jens Lund, a specialist in producing materials on local culture for visitors, spent two weeks in the Uintah Basin interviewing storytellers, performers, craftspeople and local historians from the area's Ute, ranching and mining communities. After sending copies of his interviews and photographs to the people he documented, the materials were accessioned into the Folk Arts archive for use in an upcoming audio tour highlighting the road from Heber City to Vernal. Partners in this project are the Northern Ute Tribe and the travel councils in Vernal and Duchesne.

#### **GRANTS TO INDIVIDUALS AND ORGANIZATIONS**

Apprenticeship Grants are designed to help traditional artists pass their skills along to the next generation. In fiscal year 2002, the FA Program awarded Apprenticeship Grants to ten master-apprentice pairs in art forms ranging from saddlemaking and Swedish weaving to old-time social dance music and East Indian sitar.

Ethnic Arts Grants are designed to assist ethnic organizations and individuals in perpetuating national and ethnic art forms. The FA Program awarded nine Ethnic Arts Grants in fiscal year 2002: to two Tongan organizations for an exhibit and for a festival; to Hispanic, Polynesian, Russian and Tahitian arts organizations to help purchase supplies and costumes; to the Japanese community for a bonzai workshop and the Scottish community for a kilt-making workshop; and to help produce a CD for a local Kurdish musician.

## LITERATURE PROGRAM

The mission of the Literature Program of the Utah Arts Council is to assist and encourage Utah writers at all levels of accomplishment, in all literary genres. It is also our mission to help literary organizations identify and reach out to new audiences for literature, especially literature written by living Utah writers. The Literature Program works in partnership with the entire literary community: writers' organizations, libraries, publishers, schools, colleges and universities, booksellers, public and other media, and literature presenters of all kinds.

With the annual Utah Original Writing Competition as its cornerstone, the Literature Program serves Utah's creative writing community on many levels. Help may range from assisting an individual writer on how to find a writing group, to more general assistance, such as helping organizations find writing faculty for conferences or workshops. The Literature Program co-sponsors readings and workshops statewide and keeps extensive resource files on Utah writers, workshops, literary activities, and other matters important to the literary life of Utah.

### UTAH ORIGINAL WRITING COMPETITION

This annual competition has won national recognition in the past. This year was the 44th edition of the contest. There is no entry fee, and the competition is open to all Utah residents. Each year a \$5,000 Publication Prize to assist an author in achieving publication is awarded to the best book-length manuscript from the preceding year. In fiscal year 2002, 271 Utah writers entered 390 manuscripts in the Original Writing Competition. The \$5,000 Publication Prize was awarded to the University of Nevada Press for publishing Michael Gill's prize-winning book of fiction, *Why I Lie*.

### ASSISTANCE TO WRITERS

Council staff brings writers together with writing groups, develops networks among writers and helps writers arrange reading engagements and other writing related work.

### ARTS EDUCATION

Literary artists may apply to join the AE Artist Roster from which schools and community groups around the state select artists for residencies. The state shares the cost of these residencies, which range from ten days to nine months in length.

### WORKSHOPS FOR WRITERS

The Council provides assistance and helps make connections regionally and nationally for sponsors of writers conferences in the state.

### LITERARY READING SERIES

Council staff provides assistance in selecting visiting writers to read for audiences throughout the state and in negotiating contracts with them.

### TUMBLEWORDS REGIONAL PROGRAM

The Council, in partnership with the Western States Arts Federation (WESTAF), brings writers from Utah and other states in our region to our underserved communities. The program provides readings, residencies, and other outreach activities tailored to the needs of individual communities.

## TRAVELING EXHIBITS PROGRAM

The Traveling Exhibits Program is a statewide outreach service providing schools, libraries, colleges, museums and community centers throughout the state with a variety of exhibits. The purpose of the program is to provide access to an array of visual arts, nurture the understanding of diverse art forms and cultures, and encourage cultural activities in local communities. Curated from various local and international collections, the exhibits include educational materials and press kits, as well as workshops and lectures upon request of the sponsoring institutions. Each exhibit includes 24 to 30 pieces of art and will stay at one location for three or four weeks. In fiscal year 2002, 22 exhibits traveled to 74 venues. The TEP is available to any nonprofit educational venue pending compliance with required preparation and security standards. This program is a vital element to the whole education of Utah residents of all ages and levels.

In fiscal year 2002, the Traveling Exhibits Program included the following exhibits:

**American Association of University Women of Utah:** Established in 1982 by the American Association of University Women of Utah, the AAUW Women Artists Exhibition was the first exhibit to celebrate women artists in the State of Utah.

**American Society of Magazine Photographers:** This exhibit featuring the ASMP's Utah Mountainwest Chapter represents the field of commercial, artistic, and editorial photography and the varied and interesting work of professional photographers.

**The Art in Rock Art:** The photographs in this exhibition have been selected from the initial field sessions of the Barrier Canyon Style (BCS) Project, the first study of BCS rock art as art. This exhibit features photographs by Craig Law and David Susec, who received support from the Utah Humanities Council to photo-document the Barrier Canyon rock art before any more are lost to vandalism and weathering.

**Colorprint USA:** This national printmaking exhibition is comprised of 29 prints from top printmakers in 29 states. The Traveling Exhibits Program has been fortunate to be loaned pieces for this show from the Brigham Young University Museum of Fine Art.

**Colors of China:** Creative expressions of a culture are most often depicted by children. These colorful works of art were created by Chinese children ages 6 - 12 from the Hepingli Primary School in Beijing.

**Eighty Something:** This Art Access/Very Special Arts of Utah exhibit shows recent works by five artists who lived or are living well into their eighties, including Lucille Cannon, William Lewis, Harry Taylor, Ted Wassmer, and Francis Zimbeaux.

**Navajo Children Weaving the Future:** This exhibit features hand-made rugs and blankets by Navajo children as young as four years old. Weaving traditions are traditionally passed down from mothers and grandmothers to daughters.



**Out of Print:** This exhibition of prints features 25 of Utah's leading artists, working collaboratively with master printers in the studios at Brigham Young University. The show highlights the diverse vision of Utah artists.

**Pastoral Utah:** This exhibition features pastoral scenes curated from the Utah State Fine Arts Collection.

**Photo Print Society-Capturing the Light:** This exhibit features a sampling of works by members of the Photographic Print Society, a group of Utah photographers who explore many different photo processes, from the black and white photograph to digital imagery.

**Pixels and Illusions:** Students at the University of Utah Art Department produced the images in this exhibit. Courses in digital art are an opportunity for exploration and discovery in the relatively new technology of non-film digital photography.

**Professional Illustrators:** This show features the work of former students of Glen Edwards, recently retired from Utah State University's art faculty. His students have become bookmakers and illustrators, and are among the finest artists working in all facets of the arts.

**Religions of the World:** This exhibition displays the illustrations and text from the book, *A World of Faith*. Peggy Fletcher Stack, religion writer for the Salt Lake Tribune, provided text for paintings by Kathleen Peterson, Utah artist and educator.

**School Works:** Using images and words, students, teachers, parents and administrators worked with the Children's Photographic Workshop examining the question, "does school work?" Through these images participants share their perceptions about what school is and what school could be.

**Utah High School Art:** This exhibit features 25 works selected from the Statewide High School Art Competition and exhibit sponsored annually by the Springville Museum of Art.

**Utah Millennium Project:** The Utah Millennium Project began with a charter to create an artistic visual

record of change in Utah through the end of the century. Eleven artists created 33 photographs that document people, places and things that were undergoing major change.

**Utah Photojournalism:** This exhibit features a sample of the best works of newspaper photographers throughout the State of Utah, shot between 1995-1996. This exhibition presents moments in Utah's history through the powerful medium of the still photograph.

**Utah Statewide Annual:** This exhibit of 25 images was curated from the Utah Statewide Annual Art Competition held in fiscal year 2002. This year's genres were mixed media and works on paper.

**Utah Watercolor Society:** Each year the Utah Watercolor Society sponsors a competition juried by nationally recognized watercolorists. From the show a selection of works are curated for the Utah Arts Council's Traveling Exhibits Program. The exhibit demonstrates the broad range of what is possible with this medium from traditional representational to the abstract.

**Willow Stories:** This exhibit, curated by the Utah Arts Council Folk Arts Program, features the work of ten of Utah's contemporary Navajo basket weavers. Their story baskets depict traditional beliefs, stories or legends.

**Windows in Art:** Artists participating in this multi-media invitational exhibit were asked to explore the concept of art as a window. The resulting exhibit shows a great variety of creativity and talent.

**World of the Wild:** This exhibit, sponsored by the Utah Hogle Zoo, features artworks of animals and the wild. The goal of this exhibit is to bring together the works of artists who are interested in displaying their view of the wild animals, plants, and places with which we share our world.

## UTAH PUBLIC ART PROGRAM

The 1985 Utah State Legislature passed a 1% for Art bill allocating public funds for works of art to be incorporated into new or newly renovated state buildings. The Utah Arts Council was charged with the management of this program in cooperation with the Division of Facilities Construction and Management.

The Utah Public Art Program places site-specific art in and around public spaces of State facilities to enhance these environments and help build healthy and beautiful communities in Utah. Site specific art placed by the Public Art Program and the selection committees can take

the form of architecturally incorporated elements, landscape design, glass, textile, painting and/or sculpture. The program also aids in building a quality public art collection for the citizens of Utah by accepting proposals for public art commissions from artists in Utah and all over the United States. The Utah State Legislature did not approve funding for any new public art projects for the 2001-2002 fiscal year. However, during fiscal year 2002, \$86,000 was spent on commissions approved prior to the funding stop and \$6,500 on maintenance of Utah's public art collection.

For the year 2002, in addition to the maintenance issues for the collection, the Public Art Program coordinated new projects at the following locations:

- ♦ Cowles Mathematics Building, University of Utah, Salt Lake City
- ♦ 8th District Court, Vernal
- ♦ Division of Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Community Center, Taylorsville

Of the many worthy proposals from artists all over the United States and Utah, the selection committee for

the community of Vernal and the 8th District Court could not decide between two proposals they felt were perfect. They only had the funding for one. Due to the perseverance and resourcefulness of the committee, additional funds were raised to commission a second artwork for the interior space as well as the exterior monumental sculpture at the façade of the new courts building.

Public Art Program staff assisted the 2002

Olympic Winter Games Cultural Olympiad in the coordination, installation, presentation and management of public artworks by the American sculptor Alan Houser and American glass artist Dale Chihuly. Projects were also coordinated displaying the Declaration of Independence in the Utah State Capitol Rotunda and a major exhibition about the Navajo Nation at the Olympic Museum in Laussane, Switzerland.

## VISUAL ARTS PROGRAM

The mission of the Visual Arts Program is to preserve and promote Utah's artistic heritage through the collection, preservation, documentation and exhibition of the State Fine Arts Collection; to foster and encourage excellence, recognition and opportunities for artists through a Statewide Annual Exhibition, Visual Artist Fellowships and Artist Resource Center; to promote communications with artists and organizations through increased dialogue and publication of a quarterly newsletter, and exhibitions of Utah artists' work in the Utah Arts Council's two galleries.

### UTAH STATE FINE ARTS COLLECTION

The State Fine Arts Collection, begun in 1899, now consists of over 1200 works by Utah artists in all media. The artwork is on display at the State Capitol Building, the Governor's Mansion, the Glendinning Mansion (home offices of the Utah Arts Council), Department of Community and Economic Development offices, other state office buildings and in special exhibitions sponsored by museums in the state and region. Management of the State Collection is under the jurisdiction of the Utah Arts Council Visual Arts Program. The State continues to acquire artwork through purchases made upon the advice of the State Fine Art Permanent Collection Committee and by donations from patrons and artists of the State of Utah.

### STATEWIDE ANNUAL EXHIBITIONS

Visual arts competitions and exhibitions have been a project of the state since 1899, providing juried exhibitions open to all Utah artists. Utah 2001: Mixed Media and Works on Paper was held at the Bountiful/Davis Art Center September 7 - October 5, 2001. Hundreds of artists submitted works to be juried for the exhibition. Guest jurors Christine Giles, Associate Curator of Art for the Palm Springs Desert Museum, and Bruce Guenther, Curator of Modern and Contemporary Art for the Portland Art Museum, selected six artists to receive the \$500 Juror's Awards: Marcee Blackerby, Salt Lake City; Martin Blundell, Bountiful; George Mark England, Alpine; Lou Ann

Heller, Salt Lake City; Layne Meacham, Salt Lake City; and Steven K. Sheffield, Salt Lake City. In addition, 22 works from the exhibition were selected to travel the state during fiscal year 2002 as part of the visual arts outreach Traveling Exhibits Program.

### VISUAL ARTIST FELLOWSHIPS

The Council awards two \$5,000 visual artist fellowships annually through the Visual Arts Program. The purpose of this program is to aid practicing artists of exceptional talent and demonstrated ability in their process of aesthetic investigation and creation of original works of art. Fellowships are available for individual artists practicing crafts, painting, drawing, printmaking, photography, sculpture, artist bookmaking, and working in new genres, conceptual arts and video. Fellowship grants do not require matching funds. Applying artists must demonstrate professionalism and quality in their art through slides and documentation. Artists must be Utah residents not enrolled in a degree or certificate-granting program.

In February 2002 Townsend Wolfe, Director and Chief Curator of the Arkansas Art Center, selected Jean Arnold,

painting and drawing, Salt Lake City and David Delthony, furniture sculpture, Escalante, to receive the two fellowship awards. An exhibition of their artwork was held in the Rio Gallery September 16 - November 1, 2002.

#### **ARTIST RESOURCE CENTER**

The Artist Resource Center (ARC) is designed to assist artists with professional development. This is a free library space to do research, attend workshops and meet with other artists. The ARC serves artists of all disciplines, dancers, musicians, writers, visual artists and media artists in their quest for marketing skills, specialized education, participation in local, regional, and national competitions, and researching funding sources and current activity in the arts industry. The ARC provides current periodicals and journals; a selection of books and resource materials; information on competitions and events; computers with Internet access; a dual-deck VCR; photocopier; and telephone with local access. Utah Arts Council staff members assist with information and the research process.

*ArtOps* is a Utah Arts Council quarterly listing of opportunities for artists in all disciplines. It is free to all Utah residents and is available on the Utah Arts Council web site or via print or email. *ArtOps* is compiled by the Utah Arts Council Visual Arts staff with assistance from the Artist Services Program.

#### **GLENDINNING GALLERY & RIO GALLERY**

The two galleries of the Utah Arts Council display artwork of Utah artists and collections of Utah patrons. The Glendinning Gallery is located in the main office of the Utah Arts Council. The Rio Gallery is in the south wing of the Rio Grande Depot, at 310 South Rio

Grande Street. In fiscal year 2002, over 2,500 people visited the exhibitions in the two galleries. The galleries hosted the following exhibits:

#### **GLENDINNING GALLERY (FIVE EXHIBITS):**

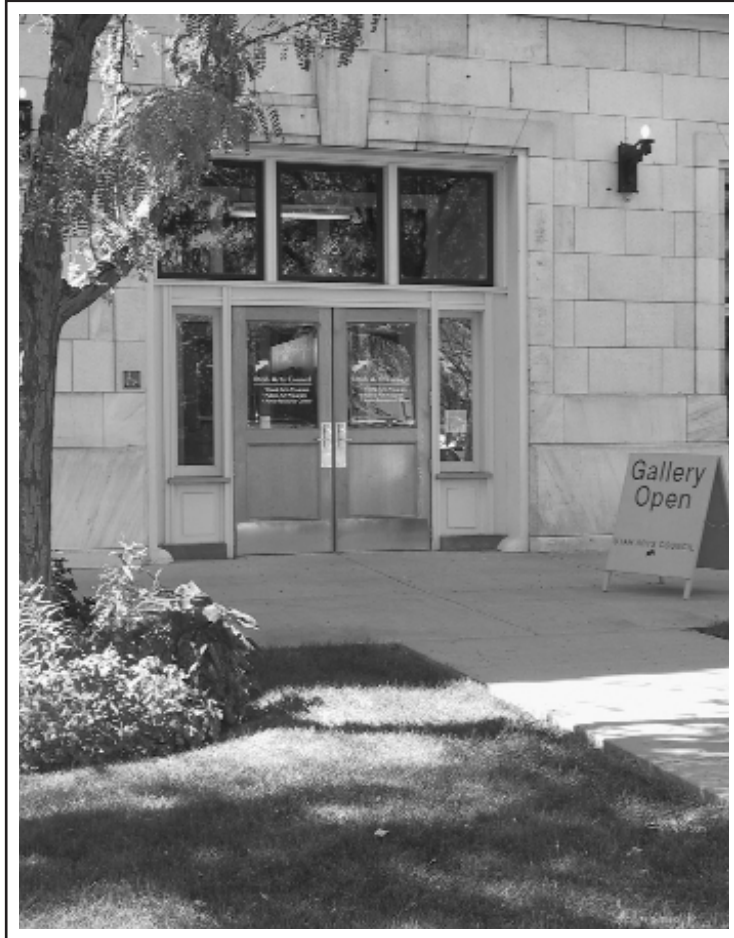

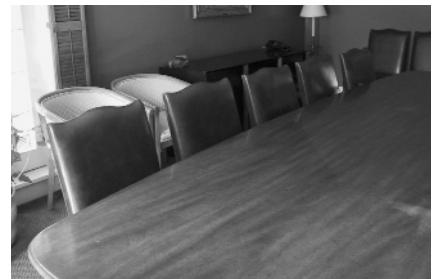
The Utah Arts Council works to make the arts available to everyone, regardless of special needs or cultural differences, and encourages all who participate in our programs to do the same.

In Fiscal Year 2001-02, 100 experts in music, dance, theatre, literature, folk arts, arts education, community arts development and visual arts from throughout the state reviewed grant applications, evaluated artist and residency applications for the Arts Education Program, reviewed applicants for Folk Art Apprenticeships and Artist Grants, and performed other critical duties.

When appropriate, panels recommend to the UAC Board of Directors priorities for Council programs, revisions of program guidelines, and development of new funding categories or pilot programs.
