

The Division conducts programs that provide more than 500 outreach services — including financial assistance — to schools, local arts councils, organizations, community centers, performing groups and individual artists.

Utah Arts & Museums offers special thanks for support from the Utah State Legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts.




Chighonleducation

Arts Education

One FY12 highlight for Arts Education was Whitehorse High School, an Arts Education Project grantee in Montezuma Creek. Whitehorse used Division funding to participate in the Native American Composers Apprenticeship Project (NACAP), an outreach program of the Grand Canyon Music Festival. The program is dedicated to teaching Native American students to compose concert music. Each year, young musicians work with a Native American composer and a resident string quartet in partnership with the school's music program. For the 2012 season, New York City's ETHEL string quartet participated as the resident quartet at Whitehorse High, the only Utah school where NACAP was implemented.

NACAP won a President's Committee for the National Arts and Humanities Youth Program Award in 2011. Representatives from the President's Committee attended the 2012 concert at Whitehorse High School, where ETHEL performed the work of Whitehorse youth composers. During the evening, each composition was introduced by the student composer. The evening closed with a full composition for the band/orchestra created by a senior in her fourth year of participating in NACAP.

Poetry Out Loud

The Division conducted its seventh annual Poetry Out Loud Program, a national poetry recitation contest sponsored by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation. The Utah State Poetry Out Loud Finals Contest was held at the Rose Wagner Performing Arts Center in Salt Lake City on Tuesday, March 13, 2012, with students from 16 high schools across Utah participating. Judges included Utah Poet Laure-

ate Katharine Coles, Plan-B Theatre Company Producing Director Jerry Rapier, poet and USU English Professor Shanan Ballam and Utah State Office of Education Literacy Coordinator Tiffany Hall.

MarKaye Hassan, a senior at Logan High School, won first place in Utah and went on to place third at the National Poetry Out Loud competition in Washington, D.C., in May 2012. MarKaye received a \$5,000 scholarship, which she plans to use as a theatre major in the acting program at Utah State University. She was selected to participate in the National Library of Congress Book Festival in September 2012, where she once again recited her winning poetry.

Mountain West Arts Conference

The Mountain West Arts Conference is a regionwide gathering providing opportunities for innovation, networking and professional development. The conference helps individuals and organizations in the arts community access essential resources and create community connections throughout Utah and the Mountain West.

More than 450 people attended the 2012 conference. Highlights included: The keynote address "Embodied Brains, Social Minds: Neurobiological and Developmental Perspectives on the Emotional Origins of Creativity," given by Mary Helen Immordino-Yang, Ed. D., Assistant Professor of Education at the Rossier School of Education and Assistant Professor of Psychology at the Brain and Creativity Institute; and the caucus session "Maps, Paths and Poems," by Jan Dworkin, Ph.D. and Randee Levine of 361 ArtWorks. Jan and Randee also held a follow-up workshop and, using information from the caucus and workshop, they created a painting entitled "Getting Closer," which was accessioned into the State Fine Art Collection.

Crimson Harps, Courtney Smith Trio, Aerial Arts of Utah and MarKaye Hassan — the 2012 Utah Poetry Out Loud State Champion — were among the Utah artists who performed. Sessions were led by experts from within and outside Utah. Some of the most highly evaluated workshops included: "Culture Connects All - Rethinking Audiences in Times of Demographic Change," presented by Robert H. McNulty, Founder and President of Partners for Livable Communities; "Barbie Legs, Bottle Caps, Buttons & Book Bits: Found-Object Sculpture," presented by teaching artist Beverly Mangham; and a session that used the gallery space at the Utah Cultural Celebration Center and which remained for another couple of months after the conference, entitled "Exploring the Art and Science Connection through Interactive Exhibits," presented by Blake Wigdahl, VP of Design and Programming at Thanksgiving Point.

Museum Studies Training

Utah Arts & Museums and Utah State University collaborated to provide eight university-level distance education courses to museum professionals and volunteers. Participants who take four courses in museum administration, education and interpretation and collections care can earn the Certificate of Museum Practice recognized by Utah Arts & Museums and the Utah Museums Association. Twenty-eight professionals took the courses in FY12, 10 of them through Utah Arts & Museums scholarships. Professionals were paired with university students to complete projects, including:

- Restructuring a working board to improve visibility in Hyrum
- Reworking a Friends campaign, updating a website and creating a blog in Bountiful
- Building new audiences with a bilingual marketing campaign in Orem
- Improving visibility with a traveling exhibition and newsletter postcards from Delta
- Outreach programming for summer events and a new volunteer training program in Orem
- Expanding volunteer opportunities to college and high school students in Price
- Reworking bilingual educational efforts to improve services in Logan
- Outreach programming to stay open through the summer in Hyrum
- Developing an educational curriculum for an all-new campus museum in Logan
- Creating materials to train volunteers in cataloging and handling artifacts in Orem
- Writing policies for the oldest collection of pioneer buildings and artifacts in Utah Valley
- Developing protocols for inter-museum development and use of collections in Delta
- Revising procedures for student volunteer cataloguing workflow in Logan
- Revision of existing collections policies in preparation for new facilities in Bountiful and Price
- Introducing new cataloguing procedures with new software in Ogden

Certified Utah Museums

The 2008 State Legislature enacted a bill creating a Certified Utah Museum designation. Museums comply with basic requirements and register with Utah Arts & Museums and become eligible for museum grants and a reduced rate on Charitable Solicitations Permits. There are 152 Certified Utah Museums.

Change Leaders

The Change Leader Program is a professional development course with an active network of course graduates. Participants attend a three-day institute with instruction on assessing environments and the skills necessary to implement change. Change Leaders practice these skills by completing a certification project and forming a network of leaders who mentor each other. Twenty-one Change Leaders certified in FY12:

Random Acts of Art

Random Acts of Art is quick-turnaround funding to help Change Leaders bring creative solutions to social and community needs. In FY12:

- The Brigham City Main Street Flyway featured colorful cutouts of local birds along Brigham City's Main Street. The birds featured can be found at the Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge.
- The Glendale ArtPark Mural Project celebrated Salt Lake City's River District with a community-themed mural directly adjacent to the Sorenson Unity ArtPark.
- The Festival of Words, a four-hour festival featuring workshops and performances that included storytelling and American Sign Language, promoted literacy in Cache Valley.
- The SLC Arts Hub Community Mural Project brought artists and community members together to create public art outside the SLC Arts Hub.
- Hands-on musical activities in South Jordan brought families together to make paper replicas of musical instruments and taught children how to use them.
- The Sanpitch Dragon was repaired after it was damaged during severe flooding in 2011. The dragon is a 218-foot-long mosaic along the Sanpitch River Walk under Highway 89 in Gunnison.
- Garden City launched a summer farmer's market that highlighted the work of area artists and performers, and encouraged residents to buy local.
- South Jordan fifth-graders received sticker kits containing chronological images from American history that, when pieced together, create a waving flag. The original hangs in the South Jordan city building.
- Porchfest brought 17 bands to 11 porches in east Salt Lake, including nursing homes and others who were isolated from their community. Almost a thousand people attended.

Arts Day at the Legislature

On February 7, 2012, more than 110 artists and arts organization professionals joined Friends of Art Works for Kids and the Utah Arts Council Board of Directors for the first annual Arts Day at the Legislature. They visited with their state representatives to advocate for the importance of the arts in Utah. Performances were given by the Crimson Harps University of Utah Harp Ensemble, junior competitors from the Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition, members of the Oquirrh Mountain Symphony and the Box Elder High School Madrigals. A traveling exhibit of photos from county fairs was temporarily installed in the Capitol rotunda.





Museum Day at the Legislature

The Utah Museums Association and the Office of Museum Services Board held Museum Day at the Legislature on February 28, 2012. Representatives from 47 museums met with their elected officials and presented displays in the Rotunda reflecting the number and diversity of Utah's museums.

Bridge Over Barriers (BOB) Project

NeighborWorks Salt Lake has been a grantee of the Division since the early 1990s, using funding to involve youth in multiple art projects under the supervision of Division-approved teaching artists. The Bridge Over Barriers (BOB) Project is the latest endeavor, begun in 1995 and completed in October 2012. The Division and UDOT joined other partners and funders in supporting one of the largest public art projects in Utah.

Under the I-15 freeway bridge that crosses over 300 North at approximately 700 West, the thoroughfare connects the Guadalupe and Jackson neighborhoods and is the primary route for students attending West High and Jackson Elementary. NeighborWorks Salt Lake sought to bridge the divide between the two neighborhoods with a public art project that would take the concrete eyesore and re-establish it as a vision of beauty.

The 300 North thoroughfare is composed of 22,000 feet of concrete. There are 16 large concrete pillars atop four massive concrete trusses that rise out of two 235-foot stretches of concrete abutment. NeighborWorks Salt Lake enlisted the guidance of internationally renowned artist and activist Lily Yeh. Yeh offered a global perspective and years of expertise in engaging the community while improving quality of life. Under her direction, prominent Utah artists were trained to create a comprehensive and aesthetically pleasing design that reflected the lives and cultures of these neighborhoods. Mosaic tile images of community heroes cover the 16 pillars, and the rising abutments are painted with scenes reflecting input from hundreds of neighborhood children, youth and adults.

Free Night of Theater

Utah Arts & Museums, in partnership with NowPlayingUtah.com, encouraged new audiences to experience the joy of theatre for the first time, or to attend a theatre company they had not previously patronized, through the national Free Night of Theatre program developed by the Theatre Communications Group. Audience members entered to win tickets to select October performances at Cache Valley Center for the Arts, Empress Theatre, Grand Theatre, Off Broadway Theatre, People Productions, Plan B Theatre Company, Pygmalion Theatre Company, Salt Lake Acting Company, Tuacahn Center for the Arts, Utah Shakespeare Festival or the Wasatch Theatre Company.



Traveling Exhibition Program

In FY12, the Traveling Exhibition Program displayed art in 32 public schools, eight public libraries, six universities, three museums, a hospital, a community center, and an arts festival. Each exhibit has an educational component that is useful to teachers who instruct students in the various art forms and techniques utilized in the artwork on exhibit. Engaging the visitor is key to our mission. For example, this year we curated an exhibit called "Untitled." It consists of 17 pieces, by 16 artists, that were not given a title by the artist. Observers are encouraged to examine the artwork and decide for themselves what it means to them and then title it appropriately. The number of communities and school districts who take advantage of our traveling ex-



hibits remains consistent, and every year we have more requests than we can fill. The demand for this program clearly demonstrates it is something communities want to experience, thus improving quality of life, educational opportunities, and recognition for Utah artists.

Design Arts

The Design Arts Program is dedicated to the promotion of excellence in the diverse fields of design in Utah. We strive to help the citizens of Utah see, experience, use and value the art of design that surrounds us daily. The design arts include architecture, landscape architecture, community design, environmental design (interior, lighting, etc.,) product design (fashion, furniture, transportation, electronics, etc.,) and industrial design.

The Design Arts Program coordinates and sponsors an annual juried exhibition of Utah designers from a wide variety of fields. In 2012, juror David Revere McFadden reviewed the work of 28 Utah designers' 55 projects. Eleven projects were selected for inclusion in the annual celebration and promotion of Utah designers. This review and exhibition provides opportunities for Utah's designers to have their work viewed by professionals in the field and to exhibit their work in venues outside the usual for the field of design. This exhibition exposes Utahns to the talent of Utah designers and demonstrates the contributions these individuals make to our quality of life and economy.

McFadden is Chief Curator and Vice President for Programs and Collections at the Museum of Arts & Design in New York City. He has served as Curator of Decorative Arts and Assistant Director for Collections and Research at Cooper-Hewitt, National Design Museum, and the Smithsonian Institution from 1978 to 1995.

After his review of the Utah designs, McFadden said: "Since the economic recession of 2009, the design world has been regrouping and reassessing design strategies for the future. If there was one positive result from the financial disasters of the recent past, it may be that designers are taking a long and serious look at why and how design will play its role in a reconfigured climate of caution, and working to make the design professions sustainable in a changing

world."



Public Art

The Public Art Program commissions artists from Utah and nationwide to create site-specific art in and around the public spaces of state facilities throughout Utah. This art, created by artists in collaboration with the community and the facility for which it is being created, enhances and helps build economically healthy and beautiful communities in Utah. These site-specific artworks, commissioned by the Public Art Program and chosen by the community-based selection committees, can take the form of architecturally incorporated elements, land-scape design, glass, textile, painting and/or sculpture. The program is working to build and add to the quality public art collection belonging to the citizens of Utah.

In addition to the continuing maintenance of the 245 artworks in the collection, in FY12 the Public Art Program began, continued or completed public art projects for:

Statewide Annual Competition and Exhibition

Visual arts competitions and exhibitions have been a project of the state since 1899, providing juried exhibitions open to all Utah artists over the age of 18. The Statewide Annual Competition and Exhibition provides exposure to both new and established Utah artists through public display, publicity and publication of catalogues. The Statewide Annual focuses on various disciplines, rotating categories in a three-year cycle: painting and sculpture; fine crafts and photography; and mixed media and works on paper.

In FY12, we focused on painting and sculpture. Our jurors were Ivar Zeile from Colorado and Julia Latane from California. Together they chose 64 pieces by 45 Utah artists. The exhibition was held at the Rio Gallery in Salt Lake City and hosted more than 300 people at its opening reception.

Rio and Alice Galleries

The Rio and Alice Galleries were created as a service to Utah artists. They provide a free venue for both emerging and established artists to collaborate on exhibits, participate in the process of producing an exhibit, and educate the community through their art. The galleries participate in the monthly Salt Lake Gallery Stroll and host public receptions on Gallery Stroll evenings.

Located in the grand lobby of the old Rio Grande Depot, the **Rio Gallery** featured "Topaz: Artists in Internment, Their Visual Work and Words" from January 13 – February 10, 2012. This show featured artworks created by Japanese-Americans during their internment at the Topaz War Relocation Center near Delta, Utah. Containing pieces on loan from the Topaz Museum in Delta, the exhibition also traveled to northern California.

The **Alice Gallery** is located at the historic Glendinning Mansion in Salt Lake City, which also houses the main offices of Utah Arts & Museums. The gallery is named after Alice Merrill Horne, a legislator who supported the arts and founded the Utah Arts Council in 1899. This gallery hosts exhibitions by Utah artists and works from the State Fine Art Collection. From May 16 – July 6, 2012, the Alice Gallery presented "Valley Rising." The pieces in this exhibition traced the diversity of people and places that have characterized Salt Lake City since its founding, filtered through the lens of 20 Utah artists in the state collection working in painting, printmaking and photography.



Governor's Leadership in the Arts

The Governor's Awards in the Arts were established in 1980 to recognize individuals and organizations that make outstanding contributions to the cultural life of Utah. In 2007, the awards changed in title and scope to recognize not only artists but arts advocates and leaders. The 2012 Governor's Leadership in the Arts Awards were presented by Governor Gary R. Herbert in conjunction with the Mountain West Arts Conference. The awardees: Community Leadership: the City of Ogden; Education Leadership: Chris Roberts of Reese Elementary; Organization Leadership: Artspace; and Individual Leadership: Teri Orr, Director of the Park City Performing Arts Foundation.

Utah Poet Laureate Lance Larsen

Utah Poet Laureate

After five amazing years, Katharine Coles ended her tenure as Utah's Poet Laureate, having traveled the state sharing her poetry. During her final year as Poet Laureate, she went to Palmer Station on an Antarctic Artists and Writers grant from the National Science Foundation and communicated to Utahns from her icy post. In April 2012, Governor Gary Herbert appointed Lance Larsen as the new Poet Laureate. Lance is currently associate chair of the English Department at Brigham Young University, where he teaches creative writing and literature. His latest collection of poems is called Genius Loci. Earlier collections include Backyard Alchemy, In All Their Animal Brilliance, and Erasable Walls. He holds a PhD from the University of Houston, and his work has appeared in Georgia Review, Southern Review, Ploughshares, Poetry, River Styx, Orion, The Pushcart Prize Anthology, Best American Poetry 2009, Poetry Daily, and elsewhere. His nonfiction has twice made the Notable Essay list in Best American Essays. Lance is currently working on Seventeen Ways to Float, a collection of essays about place, family, and memory which won first place in the 2011 Utah Original Writing Competition.

IJtah Art & Culture recognition

Fellowship Recipients

Fellowships are available for individual artists practicing crafts, painting, drawing, print-making, photography, sculpture, artist's bookmaking, and working in new genres such as conceptual arts and video. Applying artists must demonstrate professionalism in their art through quality images and documentation. Artists must be Utah residents not enrolled in a degree- or certificate-granting program.

In FY12, we awarded Jared Lindsay Clark and James Charles with this honor. Each artist received \$10,000 and participated in a short documentary video produced by the Division in association with *15 Bytes*, a non-profit arts magazine.




