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Introduction

The Utah Division of Arts & Museums acts as a state coordinator and advisor on topics of importance to the arts and museums communities. The Division conducts programs that provide more than 500 outreach services — including financial assistance — to schools, local arts councils, organizations, community centers, performing groups and individual artists.

This annual report for fiscal year 2013 highlights just some of the year's accomplishments, provides a financial summary, and gives a sampling of activities and programs supported through the Division.

Here are some notable facts from our 2013 survey of museums:

- Nearly 7 million people attended Utah museums this year (6,846,775)
- More than half (68%) of Utah's museums are free

Here are some interesting figures from the 2011 Creative Vitality Index, an annual measure of the economic health of the arts-related creative economy in Utah. The CVI draws data from two major data partners: the Urban Institute's National Center for Charitable Statistics, and Economic Modeling Specialists, Inc.:

- Creative Vitality Index: U.S.=1.00, Utah=.85 (Arizona=.71, Colorado=1.16, Idaho=.71, Montana=.87, Nevada=1.15, New Mexico=.81, Wyoming=.92)
- Utah generated more than \$140 million in nonprofit arts and arts-active revenues
- Utah has 45,582 people employed in highly creative occupations, up 3,980
- Independent artists generated the most revenue of all creative industries in Utah in 2011

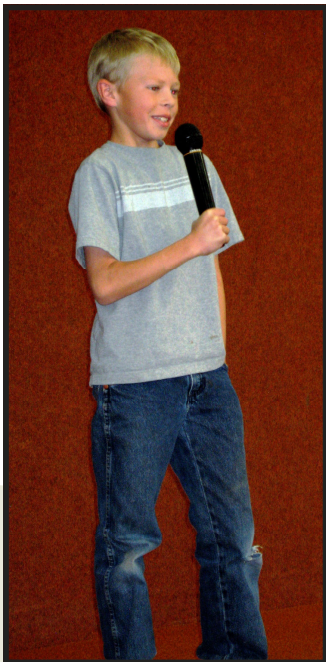


Arts *education*

Manila Elementary School

One FY13 highlight for Arts Education was Manila Elementary School in Daggett County, where artist Leticia Pizzino involved the entire school population of 83 — including teachers, volunteers and teacher assistants — in storytelling. The school used funding from the Division to make this artist residency possible. Students learned writing and public speaking skills, self-confidence, and the elements of great storytelling. The principal reported that the shyest students had the most amazing stories to tell. He was grateful for the grant, since it's the only way he's able to bring professional artists into his isolated school and community.

Teachers learned to use stories and storytelling to enhance curriculum and will use this knowledge in their classrooms. One boy had decided to not tell his story, but he was able to share it with a small group and told it to some of his friends outside of the residency setting, just because he wanted to. On a written evaluation, one student noted, “I have learned words can make a difference in any story.” Two other students wrote, “To be a good storyteller is to be a good story listener” and (original spelling and punctuation preserved) “I like it when people complement...it so fun its better than seeing a celebertie! :)”

Poetry Out Loud

The Division conducted its eighth annual Poetry Out Loud program, a national poetry recitation contest sponsored by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation. The Utah State Final competition was held at the Rose Wagner Performing Arts Center in Salt Lake City on Tuesday, March 12, 2013. Six high school students emerged as final competitors by advancing from six regions representing 27 high schools throughout Utah. Judges included Kim Burningham, member of the Utah State Board of Education; Elaine Lamb Turner, East High School English teacher; Todd Peterson, Southern Utah University English professor; and Jennifer Tonge, poet.

Devin Jones, a junior from West Jordan High School in Jordan School District, won first place in Utah and went on to receive an honorable mention and \$1,000 at the National Poetry Out Loud competition in Washington, D.C., in April/May of 2013. Devin intends to compete again in 2014.

Mountain West Arts Conference

The Mountain West Arts Conference is a region-wide gathering providing opportunities for innovation, networking and professional development. The conference helps individuals and organizations in the arts community access essential resources and create community connections throughout Utah and the Mountain West.

More than 450 people attended the 2013 conference. Highlights included the keynote address “Art, My Constant Companion,” given by Cherie Buckner-Webb, Idaho state senator, trainer, consultant and jazz/gospel singer; and the caucus session “The Future Is Now: Engaging Youth in the Arts,” led by Utah Shakespeare Festival Education Director Michael Bahr. Air-Fare, Utah Urban Dance Organization, Sammy Brue and Devin Jones — the 2013 Utah Poetry Out Loud State Champion — were among the Utah artists who performed.

Sessions were led by experts from within and outside Utah. Some of the most popular workshops included: “Art Works! The National Endowment for the Arts Working for You!,” presented by NEA Dance Director/Performing Arts Team Leader Douglas Sontag; “Responsive Design - Lessons for the Arts,” presented by ArtsJournal Founder and Editor Douglas McLennan; and a hands-on art-making session titled “Sing Loud, Sing Soft and Beat the Drum Slowly,” presented by Utah State University Music Professor Leslie Timmons.

Professional *development*

Museum Studies Training

Utah Arts & Museums and Utah State University collaborated to provide university-level, distance-education courses in museum governance and leadership and collections care to museum professionals and volunteers in the fall of 2012. Six professionals took the courses, five of them through Utah Arts & Museums scholarships. Professionals were paired with university students to complete projects, including creating strategic and succession plans and completing surveys of museum collections while prioritizing items in need of care.

Certificate of Museum Practice

Two Certificates of Museum Practice were awarded at the Utah Museums Association Conference to museum professionals and volunteers who made a significant investment in their own professional development:

State Performance Goals

Utah Arts & Museums launched updated and revised performance goals, a self-guided improvement program aligned with the American Alliance of Museums and American Association of State and Local History accreditation programs. Museums review their progress in the areas of structure, staff, finance, facilities, collections, exhibitions, education, and public relations.

Regional Nonprofit Training

Utah Arts & Museums collaborated with Utah Nonprofits Association on regional nonprofit workshops in Logan, Moab, Kanab, and Ogden and subsidized the attendance of more than 70 arts and museum constituents. Topics included outcome measurement, nonprofit resources, and event planning.

Certified Utah Museums

The 2008 Utah State Legislature enacted a bill creating a Certified Utah Museum designation. Nonprofit museums that have a collection and are open to the public can register with Utah Arts & Museums to receive the designation. They are then eligible for UA&M museum grants and a reduced rate on Utah charitable solicitation permits. There are 169 Certified Utah Museums.

Professional *development*

Change Leaders

The Change Leader Program is a professional development course with an active network of 169 course graduates from 55 cities and 21 counties in Utah. Participants attend a three-day institute with instruction on assessing environments and the communication and facilitation skills necessary to implement change. Following the institute, Change Leaders implement these skills in a certification project. Change Leaders convene through leadership circles and conferences to mentor one another and partner on projects to bring positive change to their communities through arts and culture. Random Acts of Art

Random Acts of Art is quick-turnaround funding to help Change Leaders bring creative solutions to social and community needs. In FY13:

- Youth in Boulder received arts instruction and art materials to create works that were exhibited for two months in the Boulder Community Center Gallery as part of National Youth Art Month. The works will next be used to create banners to beautify the visible side of the community recycling center.
- The Great West Institute partnered with Hawkwatch International and the Boys and Girls Club of Greater Salt Lake City to create a community mural along the route of the Sugarhouse streetcar. Based on a live raptor presentation at the Boys and Girls Club, students drew images of raptors that became the foundation for the mural, which students aged 8-14 helped paint.
- Utah Pioneer Heritage Arts created a high-quality video recording of American Indian performances held in conjunction with Indigenous Day so the performances could be shared with those unable to attend the event, and to promote greater cultural understanding and appreciation.

Chase Home Museum of Utah Folk Arts

At the Chase Home Museum of Utah Folk Arts in Salt Lake City's Liberty Park, FY13 has been a year of change and innovation. Two new permanent staff members were added and one was promoted, hours of operation changed and artists were brought together with museum visitors in new ways. Two full-time and two part-time employees now work at the Chase Home, coordinating the Division's Folk Arts, Arts Education and Literary Arts services. The museum expanded its hours and is now open during regular state business hours and on Saturdays from April through October. A new tradition was begun on Pioneer Day 2012, when folk artists were invited to demonstrate on the Chase Home porch, allowing visitors to observe techniques and view artworks in various stages of completion. It was a huge success, bringing more than 1,000 visitors to the museum that day. Artists again shared their art on Smithsonian Museum Day Live in September. The Wasatch and District Pipe Band drew visitors from all over the park. The next summer on Pioneer Day, workshops were held on the balcony so the public could not only see art being created but create some themselves.

In December 2012, staff began tracking everyone who visits the museum, not just those who sign the guest book. The result: 5,500-6,000 visitors explored the museum between July 2012 and July 2013. Visitors came from all over the world, including Nepal, Bosnia, South Africa, Poland and 19 other countries. People from 41 states, including Alaska and Hawaii, also visited. Staff gave guided tours to schools, universities and other organizations. One of these organizations was South Towne Ranch Independent Living Center. This group of senior citizens braved the snow to come see the museum. Many of them grew up in areas where the art in the Rural Gallery was common, and they taught the museum staff a few things about the art, having made similar pieces themselves.

Cache County School District

In a project funded by the Division, Cache County School District second-graders from Summit Elementary School worked with artist Kristi Grussendorf to implement drawing, painting and mixed-media collage into their reading program, “Reading Street.” After students responded to stories in their journals, they created visual images to reinforce the ideas learned. The artwork, reproduced on vinyl placards, now appears in six Cache Valley Transit District buses. The project focused on the theme “Bringing Communities Together,” an idea promoted by Cache Valley Transit District.

Students learned that pictures can convey meaning and that “no mistakes can be made in art.” Many expressed great joy and a sense of accomplishment. One student wrote (original spelling and punctuation preserved): “I love art know because it make me feel so speshl oh my gosh im crying.” Aurora Hughes Villa, District Art Coordinator for Cache County School District, noticed that a student with physical disabilities was beaming, and that students who were reluctant became focused and motivated. The artist mentioned that the second-graders took their roles seriously when sharing their art with others, posing for photos and giving interviews to the local media. The principal noted that the school was transformed by the experience and that “the funding for this project had a profound and everlasting impact on our school.” Until this project, students had not had a regular art teacher.

Arts Day at the Legislature

On February 5, 2013, more than 100 artists and arts-organization professionals joined the Utah Arts Council Board of Directors and Friends of Art Works for Kids at the Capitol Rotunda to visit with their state representatives and advocate for the importance of arts in our state. Performers included Roosevelt Junior High String Ensemble, junior competitors from the Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition, Utah Festival Opera & Musical Theatre Opera by Children, and Aspen Winds. Artist Karen Horne, a descendant of Alice Merrill Horne — the Utah representative who established the nation's first state arts council in Utah in 1899 — demonstrated portrait painting.

Museum Day at the Legislature

Thirty-five museums joined the Utah Museums Association and the Office of Museum Services Board of Directors for Museum Day on Thursday, February 28, 2013, in the Utah State Capitol Rotunda. Dozens of displays featured the variety of collections available to Utahns across the state.

Public awareness

Mondays in the Park

This season's six Mondays in the Park concerts featured eight groups representing Utah's various cultural communities, as well as six of the state's best slam poets performing during intermission. The season began with an evening of Polynesian music and dance by Tagaloa and ended with Voice of Africa, who performed traditional African music and dance. Other performers included: bossa nova music performed by Evening in Brazil; Mexican traditional music and dance by Mariachi Sol de Jalisco and Ballet Folklórico de las Américas; Japanese music and dance with Okinawa Kenjinakai, followed by drumming with Kenshin Taiko Drummers; and Middle Eastern music by Kairo by Night. Each performance included storytelling from the artists that helped expand the audience's understanding of the different cultures that make Utah their home.

Traveling Exhibition Program

In FY13, the Traveling Exhibition Program displayed 44 exhibitions in public schools, 17 in public libraries, seven in universities, one in a hospital, three in community centers, and one at an arts festival. Each exhibition has adaptable K-12 curriculum for teachers who instruct students in the various concepts and techniques utilized in the artwork on exhibit.

New exhibitions are curated each year to keep the content relevant to the field of art, and to present new and engaging works for participants statewide. New exhibitions included: *Threads of the Silk Road*, an evocative collection of photographs depicting surviving remnants of the historic Silk Road and ancestors of the civilization along its route; and *The Last Fifty*, a selection of works by Utah artists from 1962 to the present representing a variety of movements and genres.

Design Arts

The Design Arts Program is dedicated to the promotion of excellence in the diverse fields of design in Utah. We strive to help the citizens of Utah see, experience, use and value the art of design that surrounds us daily. The Design Arts are broadly defined but often include architecture, landscape architecture, community design, environmental design (interior, lighting, etc.), product design (fashion, furniture, transportation, electronics, etc.) and industrial design.

Annually, the Design Arts Program coordinates and sponsors a juried exhibition of Utah designers from a wide variety of fields. Forty projects by 24 Utah designers were reviewed by the juror. Robert L. Bliss of Salt Lake City was awarded the Juror's Choice and prize award for his furniture design, Foliate Dining Table.

The juror for 2013, Monica Ponce de Leon, is the Dean and Eliel Saarinen Collegiate Professor of Architecture and Urban Planning at University of Michigan Taubman College of Architecture and Urban Planning. Ms. de Leon co-founded Office dA in Boston and her own design practice in 2011. Ms. de Leon said in her juror's statement: "...tension between what is possible and what could be is at the heart of all the projects selected for this year's DesignArts Utah Exhibition.... they all have in common the whimsy of their ideas, paired with the delight of their execution and a love for the element of surprise. For this unlikely cohort, design is about transforming the unexpected into the everyday."

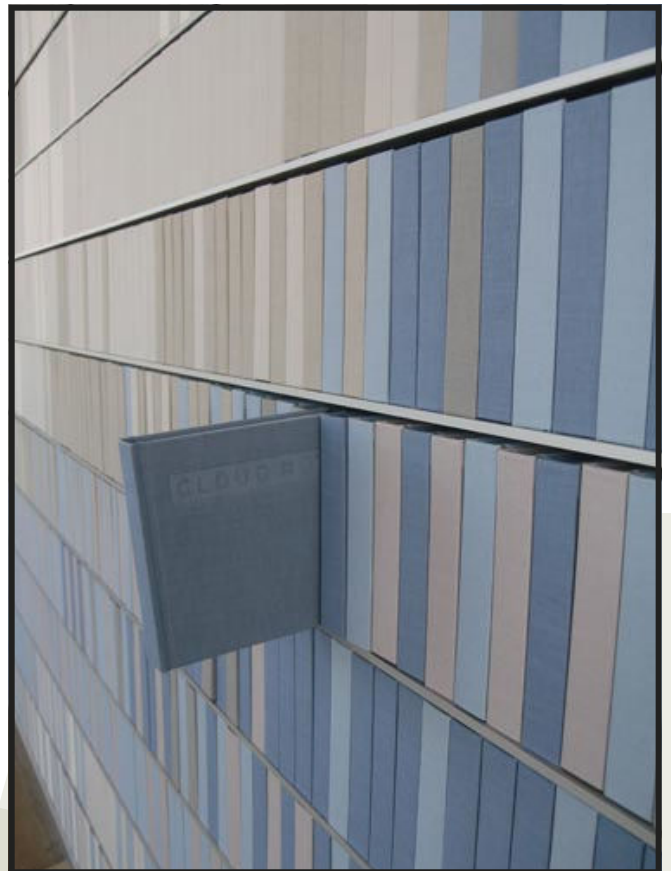
Public Art

The Public Art Program commissions artists from Utah and nationwide to create site-specific art in and around the public spaces of state facilities throughout Utah. This art, created by artists in collaboration with the community and the facility for which it is being created, enhances and helps build economically healthy and beautiful communities in Utah. These site-specific artworks, commissioned by the Public Art Program and chosen by community-based selection committees, can take the form of architecturally incorporated elements, landscape design, glass, textile, painting and/or sculpture. The program is working to build and add to the quality public art collection belonging to the citizens of Utah.

In addition to the continuing maintenance of the 245 artworks in the collection, the program began, continued or completed public art projects for:

Statewide Annual Competition and Exhibition

Visual arts competitions and exhibitions have been a project of the state since 1899, providing juried exhibitions open to all Utah artists over the age of 18. The Statewide Annual Competition and Exhibition provides exposure to both new and established Utah artists through public display, publicity and printed catalogues. The Statewide Annual focuses on various disciplines, rotating categories in a three-year cycle: painting and sculpture; fine crafts and photography; and mixed media and works on paper.

In FY13, we focused on craft and photography. Our jurors were Mary Anne Redding from New Mexico and Stefano Catalani from Oregon. We received 254 pieces of artwork from 140 artists in 12 Utah counties. Together, the jurors chose 59 pieces by 44 artists. The exhibition was held at the Rio Gallery in Salt Lake City and hosted more than 300 people at its opening reception.

Rio and Alice Galleries

The Rio and Alice Galleries were created as a service to Utah artists. They provide free venues for emerging and established artists to collaborate on exhibits and engage the community through art-making and dialogue. The galleries participate in the monthly Salt Lake Gallery Stroll and host public receptions on Gallery Stroll evenings. The Rio Gallery is located in the grand lobby of the historic Rio Grande Depot. The Alice Gallery is located at the historic Glendinning Mansion in Salt Lake City, which also houses the main offices of Utah Arts & Museums. The Alice Gallery is named after Alice Merrill Horne, a legislator who supported the arts and founded the Utah Arts Council in 1899.

As a result of the exhibition proposal process, the Rio and Alice Galleries facilitated seven exhibitions proposed by Utah artists and curators in FY13, featuring the work of more than 100 individual artists. Three new exhibitions from the Utah State Fine Art Collection that included more than 80 works from the collection were launched as part of the revitalization of programming at the Alice Gallery.

Governor's Leadership in the Arts

The Governor's Awards in the Arts were established in 1980 to recognize individuals and organizations that make outstanding contributions to the cultural life of Utah. In 2007, the awards changed in title and scope to recognize not only artists but arts advocates and leaders.

The 2013 Governor's Leadership in the Arts Awards were presented by Lieutenant Governor Greg Bell in conjunction with the Mountain West Arts Conference. Richards, Board Chair of Utah Symphony | Utah Opera; Community Leadership - Gunnison City and Mayor Lori Nay; Education Leadership - Kim Schaefer of Whitehorse High School; and Individual Leadership - Wally Bloss, Director of the Cache Valley Center for the Arts.

Fellowship Recipients

Fellowships are available for individual artists practicing crafts, painting, drawing, print-making, photography, sculpture, artist's bookmaking, and working in new genres such as conceptual arts and video. Applying artists must demonstrate professionalism in their art through quality images and documentation. Artists must be Utah residents not enrolled in a degree- or certificate-granting program.

In FY13, juror Richard Roth from Virginia recognized Mark Finch Hedengren of Provo and Christopher Gauthier of Logan with this honor. Each artist received \$10,000 and participated in a short documentary video produced by the Division in collaboration with 15 Bytes, a non-profit arts magazine.



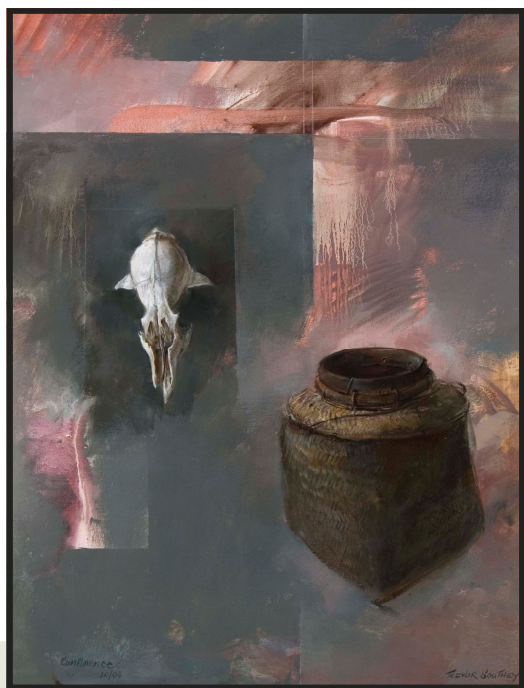

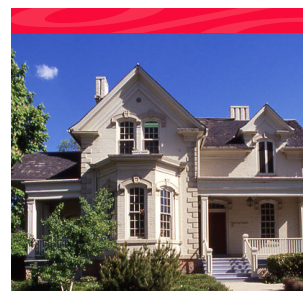

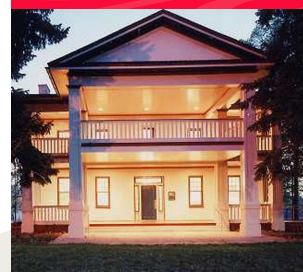
