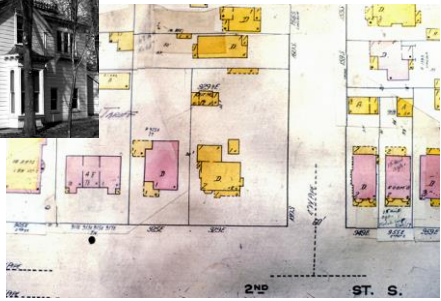

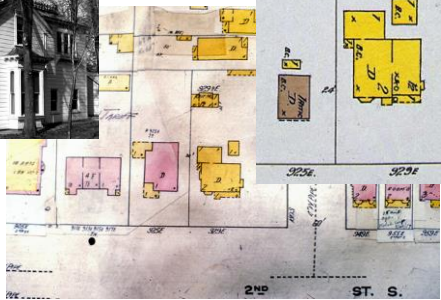

They were designed in 1847 by Sanborn & Co. Sanborn is used for insurance agents in determining the risk associated with insuring a particular property. The map surveys meticulously document the structural evidence of urbanization - building by building, block by block, and community by community.

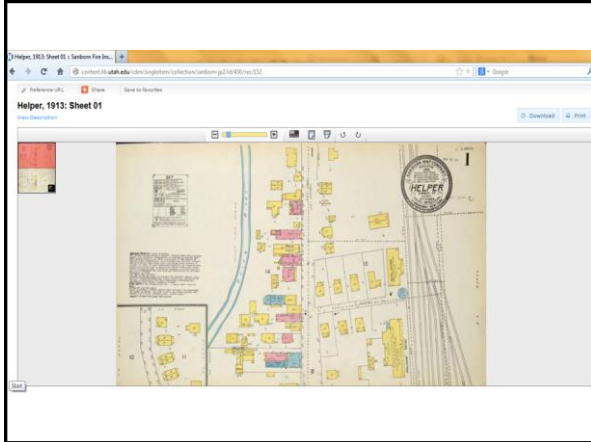

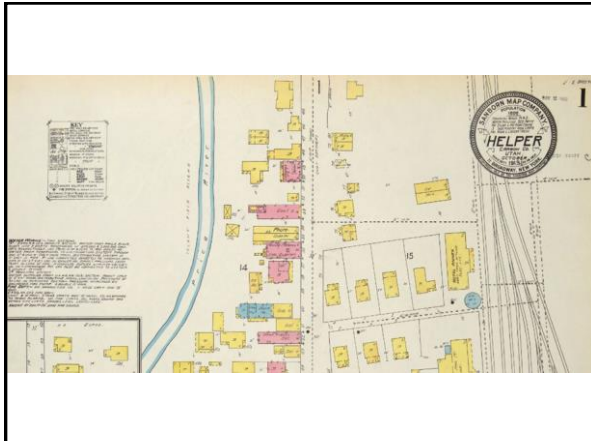

Barn built in 1872 holds lots of history for Lehi residents

A barn is just a barn, of course, unless it's the barn behind the Wabbs home at 651 N. 200 East. This is one of town's oldest historic structures. I'll tell you why.

From the fall of 1872 until the 1873 Lehi was the terminus of the Utah Southern Railroad. The Stage Road (now State Street) between

First and Third East was a hub of commercial activity, much of it centered around transfer and freight.

All goods shipped by rail were loaded into wagons and transported to their final destinations. In the meantime, horses had to be fed and stabled while awaiting their traveling orders. That was the purpose of this barn now tucked behind the Wabbs home.

The structure was built north of the Utah Southern Depot (approximately where 1-15 now crosses Second East) sometime in 1872 or 1873. After the railroad moved to American Fork in 1873, and Lehi business declined, the local war

brought the barn, disassembled it and moved it to the tilling lot.

lation activities in town. Sporting events were held there during the afternoon, and for cream was first introduced to Lehi under the shade of towering black willow trees of the property.

Andrew Pelt, 10 years old at the time, later recalled that "I recall, Evans family were serving some white looking material which they called ice cream, the price of which was five cents and ten cents per dish. This was the first time that the people of Lehi had heard of such, anything of this sort so common and varied article of refreshment. As the children and I were very scarce, it was a common occurrence to hear the children ask for one five cent dish with three

After the games were finished, a children's dance was held in the tilling lot, which had been especially fitted up for the occasion. It previously had a dirt floor, but members of the centennial committee had installed a rough plank one.

Red pine logs, cut in the Boulder Mountains of Bush Valley, were hauled to Cedar Fort and sawed into lumber. These thick, rough planks were then laid crosswise on sleeper beams of West Canyon timber and a dance floor was ready.

This historic barn, built in the early 1870s, was known in early Lehi as Centennial Hall.

The music was furnished by James and Hyrum Kirkham, who later formed the famous Kirkham Brothers' Band.

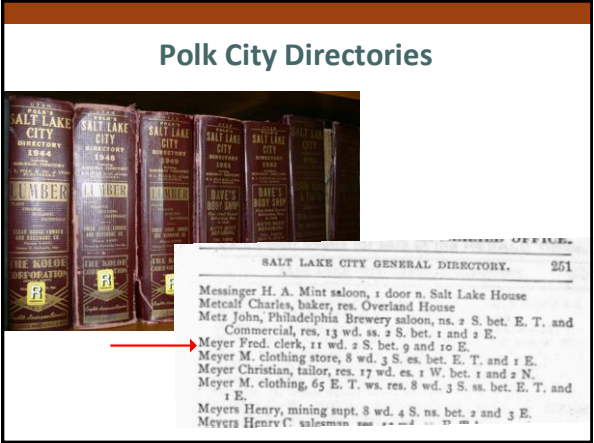
Footraces, ice cream eating and barn dancing were not the only events held on the tilling lot that long-ago Independence Day. When the evening alone darkness, the first fireworks ever exploded in Lehi were set off. The unsuspecting crowd was startled by the bursting rockets.

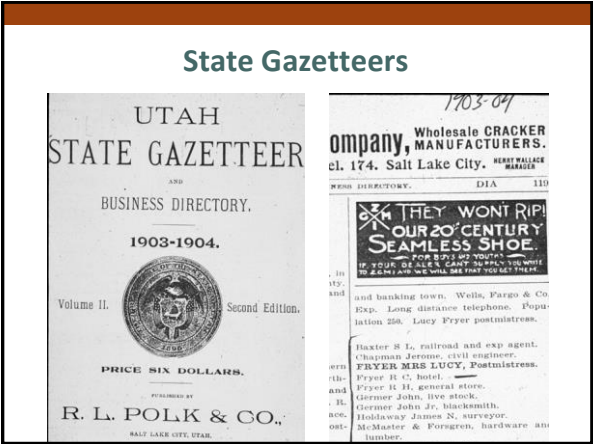

This together with the building of the Bothwell and Hammond Canals caused a boom during which a number of business houses were established in Deweyville. Robert C. Fryer built a commodious hotel and carried on a very successful business for a number of years. J. B. McMaster and J. H. Forsgren established a lumber and hardware business there;

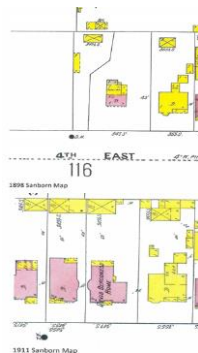

STEELE, JOHN, son of John Steele, born 1768, Ireland, and Mary Kennedy, born Oct. 15, 1780, Hollywood, Ireland). He was born March 21, 1821, Hollywood. Came to Utah July 1847. John Steele, an Irish boot and shoe maker, joined the Mormon Church and, with his wife and children, migrated to America in 1845. Following a stay in St. Louis and Nauvoo, he joined the Mormon Battalion.

After mustering out of the Mormon Battalion, the group, including the Steele family, arrived in Salt Lake Valley on July 30, 1847. Soon after, on August 9, 1847, Catherine delivered a little girl who was named Young Elizabeth Steele, in honor of President Young and John's sister Elizabeth. This daughter was the first white child born in Utah.

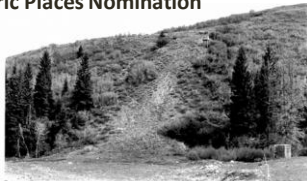

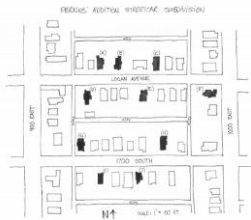

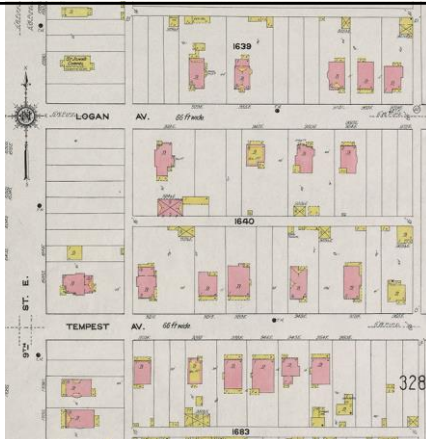
Perkins' Addition, Salt Lake City

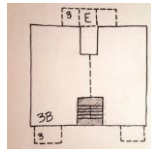

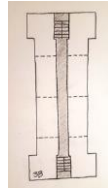

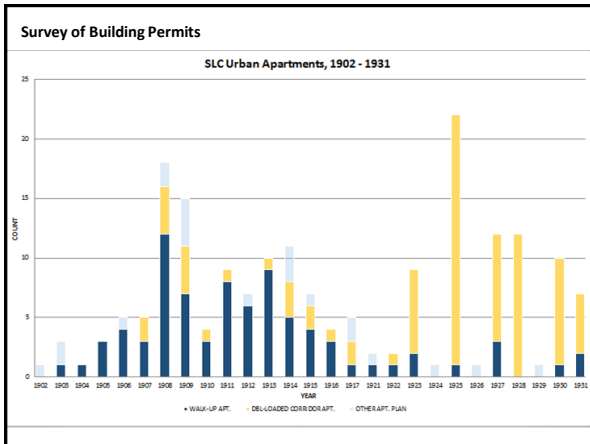

(Depression)

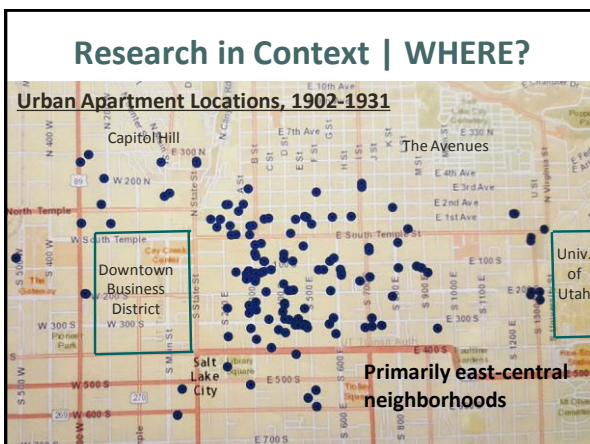





Research in Context | WHY?

Key Elements

- Rising Land Values / Financial Issues
 - ✓ (denser housing needed/wanted; affordability)
- Population Boom
 - ✓ 1900-1910: 76% increase (53,000 – 93,000)
 - ✓ 1900-1930: 164% increase (53,000 – 140,000)
- Inadequacy of older houses
- New types of residents (“transitional”)
- Transit available: electric streetcars








SELLING POINTS OF URBAN APARTMENTS

- Modern conveniences
- Proximity to downtown
- Safety



Variety of Sources = Accurate Profile

Sources:

- City directories
- Sanborn maps
- Census records
- Building permits
- Newspapers (real estate sections, etc.)
- Personal accounts
- Building features and configurations

Issues:

- Gender
- Age
- Life stage
- Persistence rates
- Income/Occupation
- Convenience (transit, flexibility, proximity to work, etc.)
- Safety
- Affordability
