According to research professor, author and speaker Brené Brown, we mostly blame when we are in pain or angry. "Here's what we know from the research," she says, "Shame is the intensely painful feeling or experience of believing that we are flawed and therefore unworthy of love and belonging – something we've experienced, done, or failed to do makes us unworthy of connection. I don't believe shame is. Blame is simply the discharging of discomfort and pain. It has an inverse relationship with accountability."
